Educators from the ELC and Point Pearce attended a professional training about Bookmaking. Bookmaking is pedagogy which supports our philosophy around children being competent and capable learners rather than seeing children as ‘empty learners’.

BUILDING ON EXPERTISE

Bookmaking supports and builds onto the wealth of literacy knowledge and experience children bring with them to Preschool.

Bookmaking also reflects our belief about play based learning. Whilst children are creating books driven by their own ideas, knowledge and interests they are at play with writing and reading.

Bookmaking encourages children to think and feel powerful like a writer or author as they create their own books.

Bookmaking, “engages children in language and literacy, motivates them to become deeply involved in their learning and also excites educators when they see children learning to their potential.”

We have been both delighted and impressed with the books our authors have been creating. Children are confident and enthusiastic to share their books during group times and with each other.

WHO SANK THE BOAT?

The use of story tables supports and extends the pedagogy of bookmaking. This week we have been exploring the book, “Who Sank The Boat.”

Children have created their own books when exploring and reflecting on this story, as well as recreating it using props.


Through the use of explicit teaching, children have gained understanding that every book has a title and characters.





ATSI INDUSTRY SKILLS EXCHANGE

PIRSA Fisheries Enhancement Project Officer, Sarah-Lena Reinhold and The Nature Conservancy's Marine Restoration Coordinator SA, Anita Nedosyko led the talk and hands activities.



Shellfish Reefs

Gary and Jamie from the Narungga Council taught the students different Narungga words and helped students vote on a Narungga name for the reef.



REEF FACTS

- The reef is made up of a series of limestone rows 8-10m underwater.
- The habitats contain over 800 tonnes of limestone and cover four hectares.
- The rows will be layered with Pacific Oyster shells and juvenile native oyster shells
- The reef will be expanded in 2018 to cover a 20 hectare area, including a further 17,000 tonnes of limestone and 7 million baby oysters!
- Once complete, the reef will provide food and habitat for fish production, increase water quality, assist with coastal erosion, and contribute to a healthier marine environment.

The students are working on a report in which they play the part of a health official with the job of controlling an outbreak of hypothetical Disease X which has hit a small rural town.




