GOODBYE TO THE YEAR 12'S

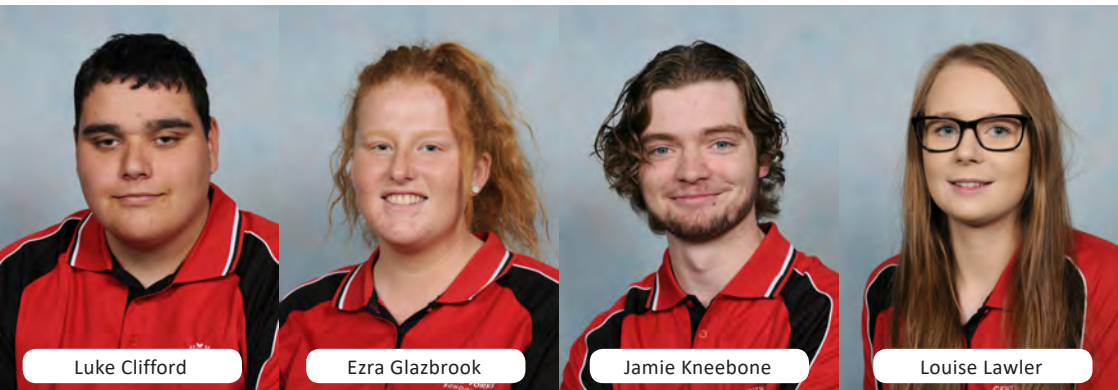
This week we say farewell to our Year 12 students.

NQS REPORT

The ELC has received the draft report from the assessment conducted last term by the Education and Standards Board. We are pleased to announce that our Centre received the rating of Exceeding the National Quality Standard in all seven of the Quality Areas, with an overall rating of Exceeding the National Quality Standard.

I would like to congratulate our team for the quality education and care they provide for the children and families in our community.

Your dedication and hard work is reflected in our assessment rating. I would also like to thank the children, families and the School community for their ongoing support and the contribution they make to the successfulness of our Centre.

WHAT IS THE NQS?

The National Quality Standard (NQS) is a key aspect of the National Quality Framework (NQF) and sets a high, national benchmark for early childhood education and care, and outside school hours care services in Australia.

It gives services and families a better understanding of a quality service, helping families to make informed decisions about the services providing education and care to their child. The NQS brings together the 7 key quality areas that are important to outcomes for children.

1. Educational program and practice
2. Children's health and safety
3. Physical environment
4. Staffing arrangements
5. Relationships with children
6. Collaborative partnerships with families and communities
7. Leadership and service management

The NQS contains 18 standards with two or three standards in each quality area. These standards are high-level outcome statements. Under each standard sit elements that describe the outcomes that contribute to the standard being achieved. There are 58 elements in total.

University Connect is a University of South Australia program that offers senior school students the opportunity to experience University learning environment and activities.

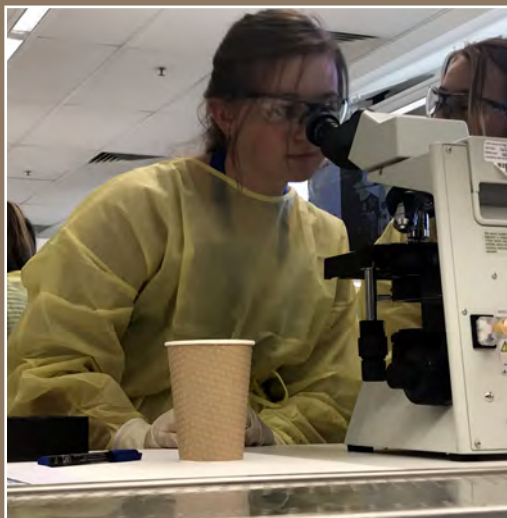

readiness of their graduates. It challenged many of our students as they were encouraged to think about potential careers and learning pathways they had not yet considered.



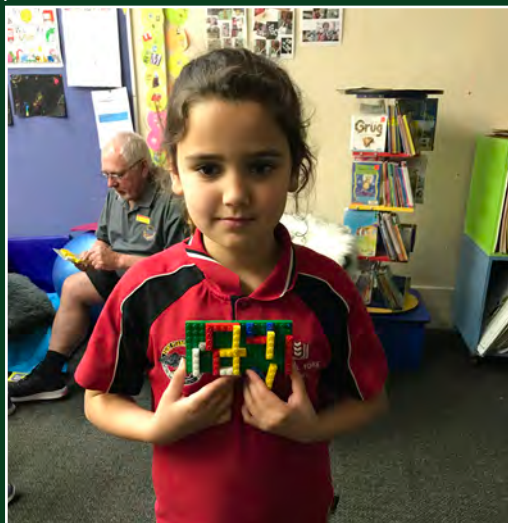


LEARNING STORY:

During our STEM lesson with Mr Andrew this week the students completed several Lego challenges.

First they had to use Legos to make a pattern. Some made it in colours and size patterns.

Then students had to build their name out of Lego. Some arranged the blocks on the floor, while others constructed the letters on Lego baseboards.

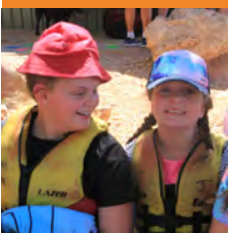

ILLaWonga Camp

Thirty four Year 5's and 6's left school bright and early on October 16— the first day of Term 4—heading for camp at Illawonga on the Murray River.

The campsite was originally built to showcase gymnastic equipment and was used by the Australian Olympic team in the 1980s as a out-in-the-middle-of-nowhere training centre. This week however it was ours!

MONDAY

Aquatics was first on the agenda. After a taco lunch and an introduction to the campsite, we headed down the hill to the Murray River.

There were three aquatics activities to choose from and students rotated through the them as the afternoon progressed.



The knee-boarding proved most popular, with several students demonstrating their proficiency.

Swimming in the 'waterhole' with life-jackets was a big hit too. Floating cushions were used as targets for jumps, dives and bellyflops.

New to Illawonga were the paddleboats. These four person craft were paddled by the bow-pair with the stern pair kicking water at other boats.

After the evening meal we headed into the gym for a round of gymnastic activities and an introduction to the

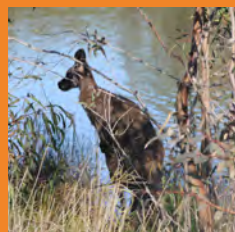
foam pit. We finished the evening with marshmallows around the campfire.

TUESDAY

We split into two groups for Tuesday's activities.

Group A took the 'River Truck' across the Murray and explored some deep caves in the cliffs. We experienced total darkness and hunted for fossils in the furthest reach of the cave.

Group B meanwhile had completed a trek down the Murray to the Big Bend, toured a hidden billabong and watched birdlife including





kestrels. On their return they had learned the basics of kayaking and paddled across the Murray and into a nearby billabong. Once there they had played hide and seek, chasey and splash the teacher.

The two groups then swapped until it was time to return for a late lunch.

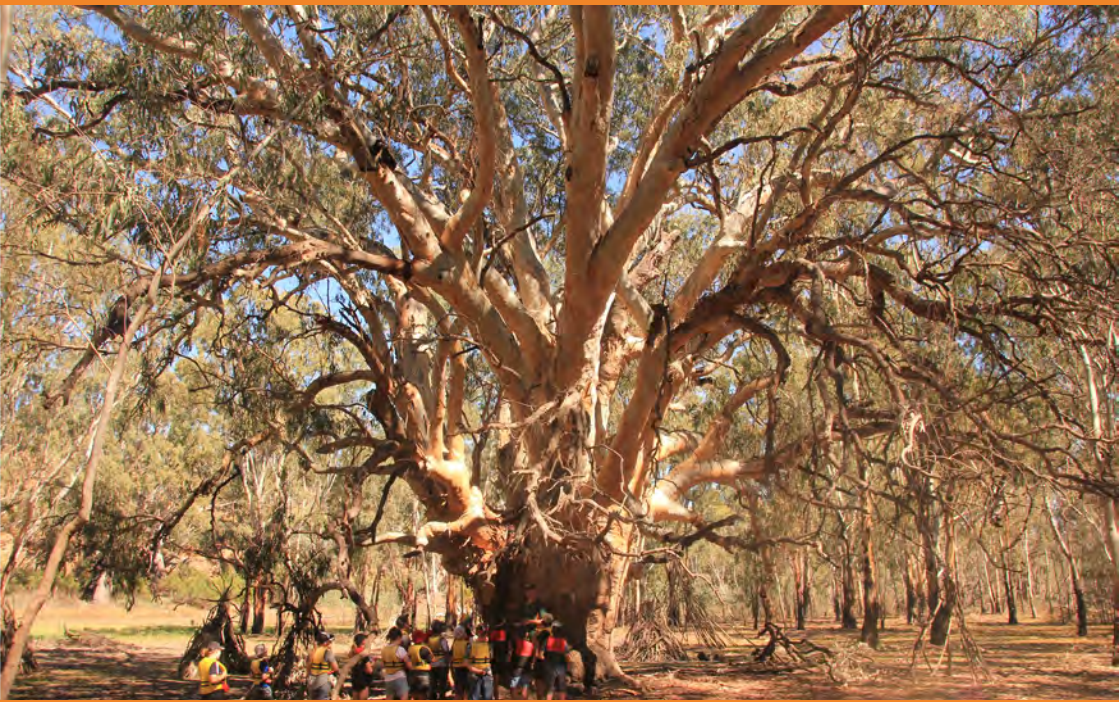
We boarded the bus for the next round of activities and travelled by ferry into Swan Reach.

We saw the flood markers on the local buildings then arrived at the Yabbie Farm, where we learned how to cast lines and

capture the aquatic animals. A group competition saw the boys catching over forty yabbies in their buckets.

Back at camp we had our evening meal then re-boarded the bus to travel out to the Big Bend, this time by road.

"Big bend at Night" is a marvellously entertaining farming show with shearing, sheep dogs, sheep racing and much more. Students bid in a sheep auction, learned how to crack a bullwhip, visited the petting zoo and got lost in a secret maze.



WEDNESDAY

We were up bright and early on our last day in camp, cleaning the dormitories, packing bags and organising for the bus.

After breakfast we again split into groups with students learning archery out the back of the campsite and a second session in the gym, hiding in the foam-pit and playing gladiators.

The bus arrived just after noon and we headed back to Maitland for a 3:30 return.

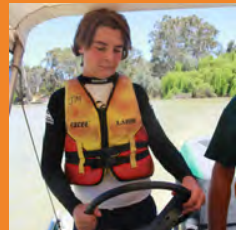

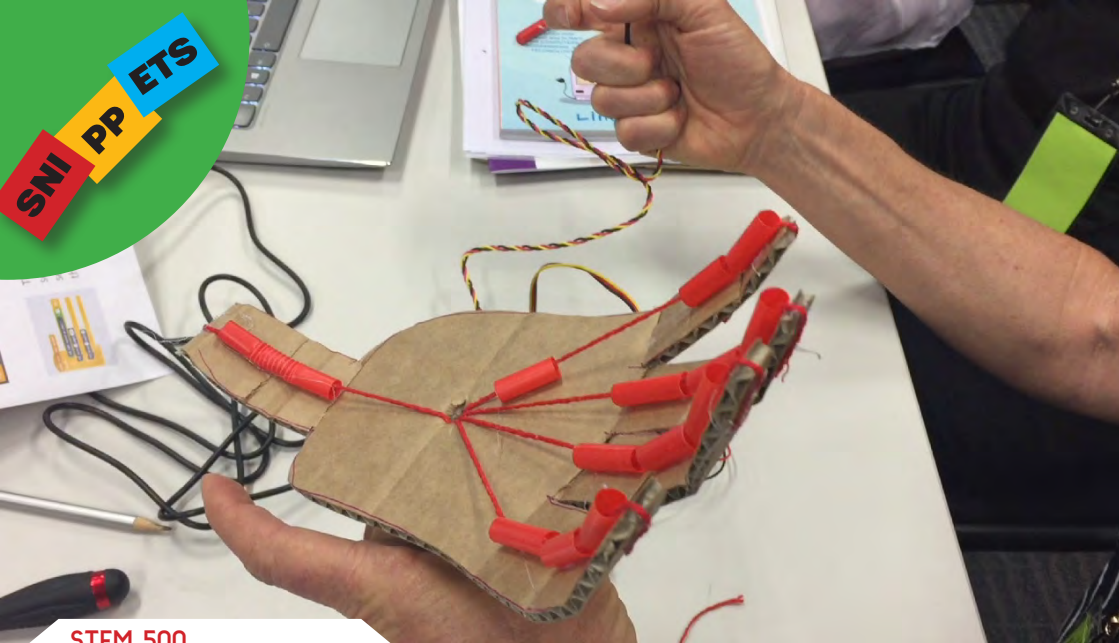
Illawonga is an action-packed camp and made all the better for the wonderful leaders including Mark, Joseph, Shona and Darren.

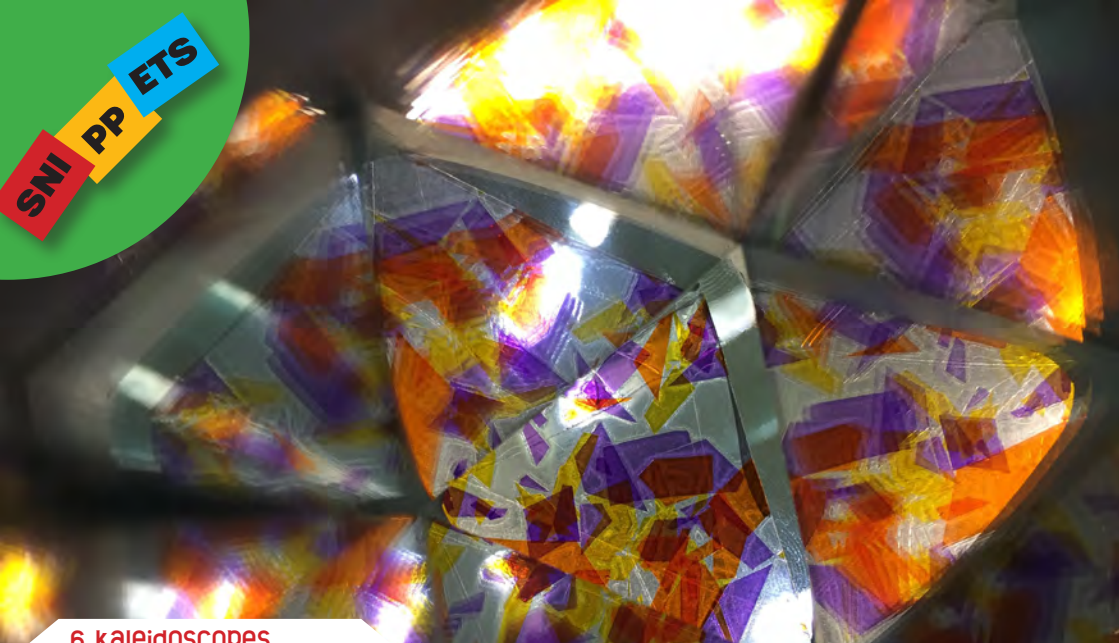

CHANGES TO SCHOOL CARD ELIGIBILITY

The state government is raising the school card income threshold from next year to help families with the cost of living.

This means that families with 1 child and a gross income of \$57,870 in the 2016-17 financial year will be able to apply for a school card.

Application forms for 2018 will be available from schools or www.sa.gov.au by the end of the 2017 school year.
