## Governing Council AGM

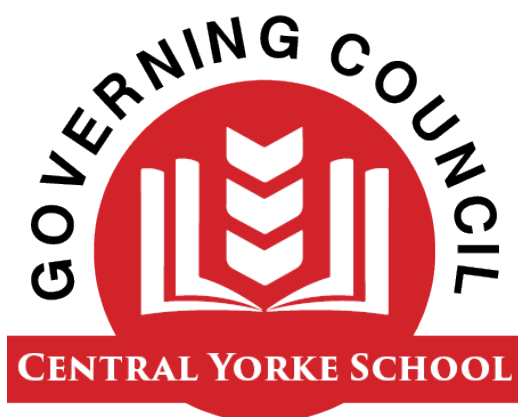

# Big Ideas in Number

**A**ustralian Professor Dianne Siemon has utilised extensive research from both Australia and overseas to propose six "Big Ideas in Number"; mathematical concepts that students need to master to ensure understanding and progress in maths at primary and secondary school.

## The Big Ideas

The Big ideas are represented at six levels: .

**LEVEL 1** **Trusting the Count.** (EOY 1)  
Developing flexible mental objects for the numbers 0 to 10.

**LEVEL 2** **Place-value** (EOY 2)  
The importance of moving beyond counting by ones, the structure of the base 10 numeration system.

**LEVEL 3** **Multiplicative thinking**(EOY 4)  
The key to understanding rational number and developing efficient mental and written computation strategies in later years.

**LEVEL 4** **Partitioning** (EOY 6)  
The missing link in building common fraction and decimal knowledge and confidence.

**LEVEL 5** **Proportional reasoning.** (EOY 8)  
Extending what is known about multiplication and division beyond rule-based procedures to solve problems involving fractions, decimals, per cent, ratio, rate and proportion.

**LEVEL 6** **Generalising** (EOY 10)  
Skills and strategies to support equivalence, recognition of number properties and patterns, and the use of algebraic text without which it is impossible to engage with broader curricula expectations at this level.

Children typically master the 'Big Ideas' by the end of the indicated year level. Children who do not master the ideas will struggle as they move into higher year levels and do not have the mathematical skills, concepts and understandings to progress.



# Big Ideas at CYS

Last year our Numeracy Site Improvement Team looked at the 'Big Ideas' as a way to improve our students mathematics from Reception through to Year 10.

In late 2017 and early 2018 secondary Maths teacher Sarah Townsend and Primary Maths teacher Hannah Clift led the testing of all CYS students to assess their level of understanding of the 'Big Ideas'.

The testing used concrete materials and practical problems to give students every opportunity to demonstrate their thinking.

From the testing, students were placed into groups according to their particular needs. Lesson time was allocated in the school timetable with additional staff – teachers, leaders and SSOs – being made available to maintain small sizes.

Secondary groups meet each Friday for one lesson while Primary groups meet Thursdays for one lesson.

The groups are cross-age and fluid; as students show mastery of a 'Big Idea' they may move to a group focused on a higher level.

We will share more of this exciting program with you in future newsletters.

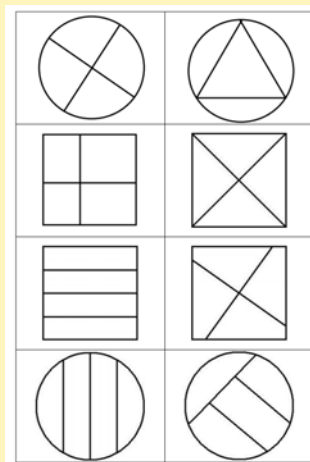

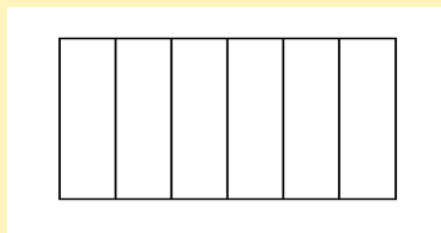

### Level 4: Partitioning

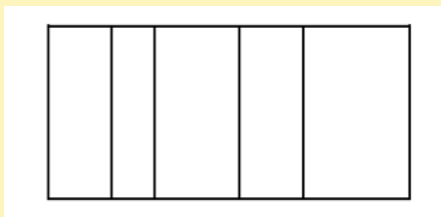
"Look at these squares and circles. They've all been divided into 4 parts. Which ones are fractions?"

# Starting On Track

**A** HUGE thank you goes to all parents in our 'Early Years R-2 Family' for helping the children come ready for school each day...we are all thoroughly enjoying working with your beautiful little people.

## Jolly Phonics

The Jolly Phonics and Daily 5 Reading literacy programs are working well. We have covered the following sounds: s, a, t, i, p, n, c/k, e, h, r, m... as part of the 42 basic sounds of the English language.

One new sound per day is a rapid pace, but most children are managing to keep up, with some spelling and reading simple words already!

We have also managed to "Read to Self" (silent, uninterrupted reading) for over 1 minute...working on our concentration 'stamina'...it is amazing to see in action!

Obviously the children are 'reading by pictures' at the moment, as one method of reading.

The three methods taught will be: Read by Pictures, Read by Words, and Retell Stories, as the term progresses.





## Maths

Our Maths lessons are on track as we follow the Targeting Maths program. Number work took place in Weeks 1 & 2, with 2D shapes, colour recognition and patterning in Week 3.

Lessons are a mixture of teacher directed learning, bookwork and hands-on exploration of the concepts, coupled with many games and Math's songs, as these help the children stay focussed and makes learning fun. The children are encouraged to work well together, use the 'Math's language' for each topic and share materials. I am really seeing some improvements in cooperation, peer and collaborative learning.

Weekly Maths assessments and observations will also take place to check understanding of each topic covered.

## Curriculum

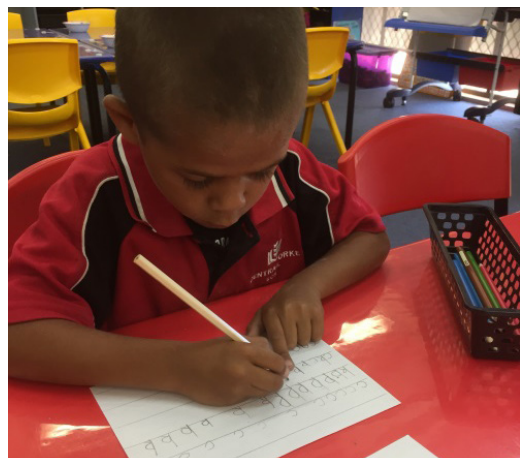
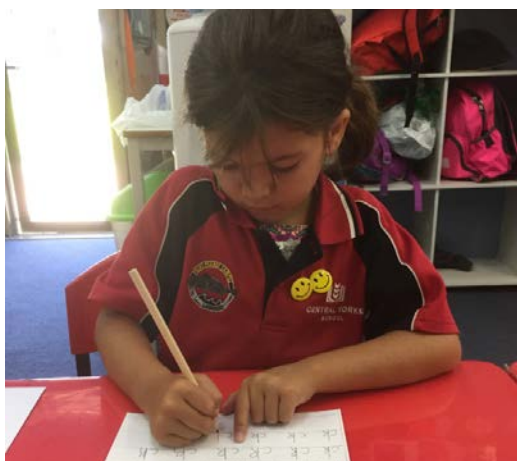
All other Term 1 subjects are on track: Science with Mr. Love – 'Our needs and animal needs.' Geography unit on 'Place' in HASS. In Health & PE we have learnt about the brain and how it works and have been busy with swimming in Week 2.

We are building relationships with one another and working hard to be: 'the best us we can be' while respecting each other, ourselves and all property.

## Communication

Communication & Sound Books between home and school are vital to our ongoing connection and the children's learning of their basic English sounds, so please check these daily for nightly homework and initial all notes...thank you.

# Point Pearce SACE Students

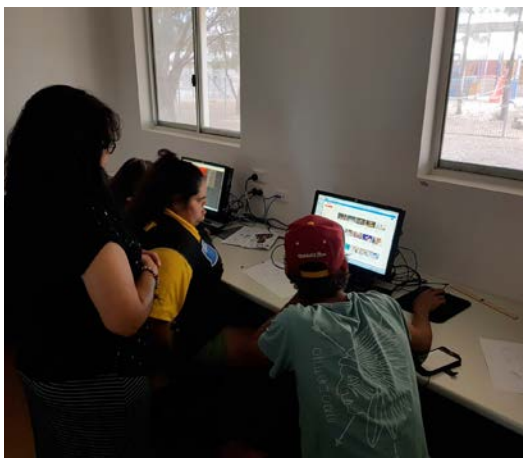

# PERFORMING

**O**ur school's 2018 Performing Arts program has got off to a big start with classroom music and drama, instrumental music, concert band and Festival choir programs all up and running.

## Classroom music

All the primary students are learning to play the ukulele in lessons. We have introduced simple strum patterns and our first chord with the younger classes and are learning more complex patterns with the upper primaries.

We have a huge 'Instrument A-Z' chart on our music room wall. Each week we learn about a new instrument. So far we have done the Accordion, Bongos and Didgeridoo (we're learning about the clarinet next week!)

The Year 7/8 classes are exploring instrument classification and are working in small ensembles to create original pieces.

The Year 9/10 group are recording songs, adverts, voice overs and more as they use software to make their own radio shows.

## Classroom drama

Primary classes have started the year with mime. The JP have already ridden horses on a farm and got stuck in traffic in their cars. The Year 4/5 class is exploring a giant pyramid and the Year 6 class are re-enacting momentous moments in Olympic sport.
