This term there have been some great achievements for teaching and learning this term. Some of these include:

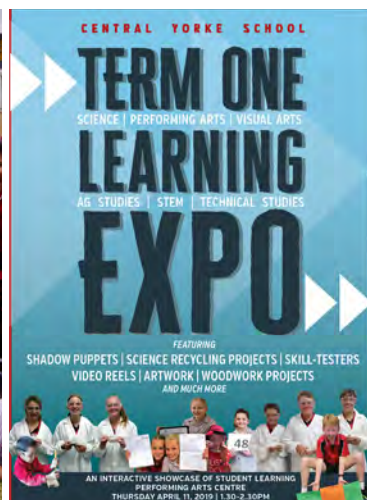
- Upgrade of learning spaces and the staff room.

Student Mobile Phone Policy Change

Changes have been made to the school student mobile phone policy. The most important change is that:

” *Students will not use mobile phones during the school day, be it in classes or at breaks.”*

Basically we are banning the use of mobile phones by students during the time they are at school. The reason for this is to promote learning without the distraction of calls, texts and social media.

If parents still wish to contact their child they are able to do so through the front office.

There will be a three-week grace period at the beginning of Term 2 before the policy is implemented. The amended policy is printed in full on page 6 of this newsletter.

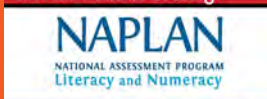

Mobile Phone Policy

Rationale

The core business of our school is to promote and support teaching and learning in an environment free from unnecessary distraction or disruption. Our priority is to establish and maintain an environment where students are safe and engaged in their learning in line with our values of Respect, Resilience and Relationships.

The staff and Governing Council of Central Yorke School acknowledge the importance parents place on the safety of their children. The ability for children to be able to contact parents in cases of emergency or danger is essential. Access to mobile phones by children has become a useful tool for families to keep in touch with each other in such circumstances. We also acknowledge the inherent risks associated with mobile phones and the impact of social media and cyberbullying on safety and wellbeing.

The staff and Governing Council of Central Yorke School deem the use of mobile phones by students between the school hours of 8:30am and 3:00pm unnecessary as both parents and students have access to each other through the normal communication channels at school.

Parents can email d1.0761.info@schools.sa.edu.au, use the Skoolbag App or ring 88 322 613 and get messages to children to alter plans or to ensure their safety in times of family emergencies. Children are able to use the school phone to contact parents, if required and when directed by a member of staff.

Policy Statement

Central Yorke School accepts no responsibility for the theft, breakage or loss of a mobile phone if a student brings one onto the site. The school also accepts no responsibility for students who lose or have their mobile phones stolen while travelling to and from school.

Students will not use mobile phones during the school day, be it in classes or at breaks.

Teachers carry phones when on excursions and camps, which are used to keep in contact with the site and in cases of emergency. In a camp situation contact details will be made available to parents prior to departure.

Consequences

Should a student use a mobile phone during school hours:

First occurrence will result in a warning, which will be recorded on Sentral

Second occurrence: The student will surrender his/ her phone. It will be held at the front office and may be collected by the student at 3pm or the end of the school day for that student.

Third occurrence: The student will surrender his/ her phone. It will be held at the front office and must be collected from a member of the leadership team by a parent or caregiver after 3pm.

Should any **further instances** occur this may result in further consequences at the discretion of the principal.

COURSES *for* HORSES



The year 7- 12 students have been lucky enough to have the opportunity to work with two horses for three weeks. Sheree Brennan brought them in Monday, week 9 and the Year 9s unloaded them off the float. Their names are Jack and Hunter. Jack is a 19 year old chocolate brown thoroughbred and Hunter is a 9 year old Bay standardbred. Both horses are 16 hands tall.

Feeding roster

We made up a roster for who feeds them in the mornings and who feeds them at lunch times. For their feed we do up one bucket each with two types of muesli, one scoop of wheaten chaff and one scoop of oaten chaff. Then we add a bit of water and mix it around.

Horse riding

Everyone has also had the opportunity to have a go at riding the horses. Everyone has been very calm around them and have gone out of their comfort zones. We have learnt new things like how to put a saddle on, how to lift their feet up and

what to look for, how to brush them and just how to act around them. There have been many different levels of riding. Some people have had the courage to just get on the horse and get led around while others have had a trot with no lead.

There have been a few experiences like one person falling off Hunter, but they got back on and kept going.

Trick pony

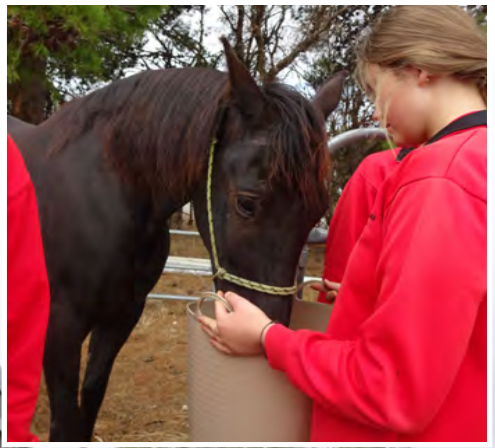
Sheree has come and shown us a few cool tricks with the horses like lunging and stretching the horses. She also taught us how to direct the horses and to get them to trot.

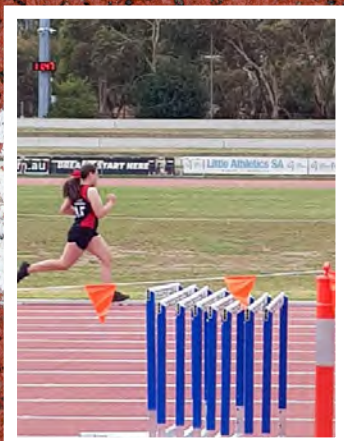

From there, SANFL will select eight Indigenous players to push for selection in the AFL's Boomerangs

team and a further four Multicultural players to be considered for the AFL's All-Nations line-up.

The program has been a great pathway and excellent starting point for players such as Woodville-West Torrens' Martin Frederick, who after representing SA's All-Nations side, eventually went on to being selected by Port Adelaide under the AFL's Next Generation Academy rules. 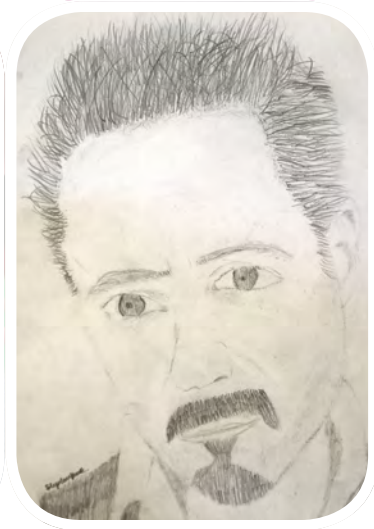
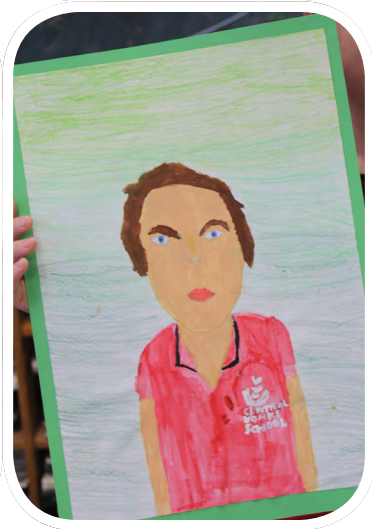
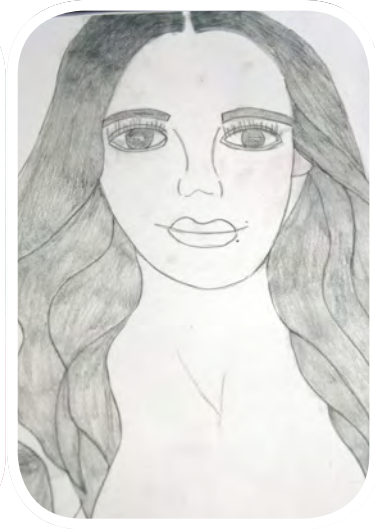




Portraiture

Years 5 & 6

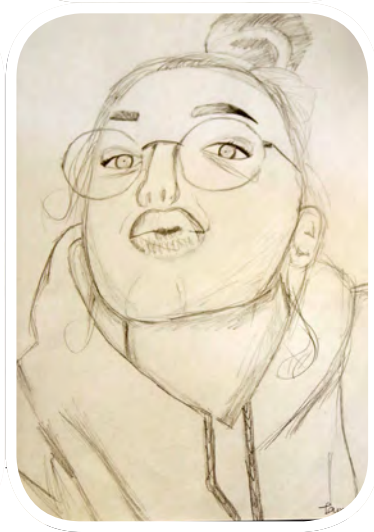
- Using visual conventions to express a personal view in their artworks.

Years 9/10

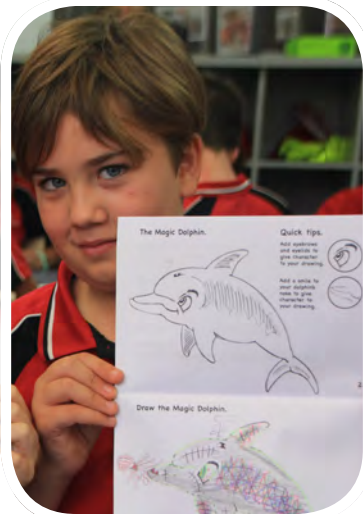
- Manipulating materials, techniques and processes to represent ideas and subject matter in their artworks.

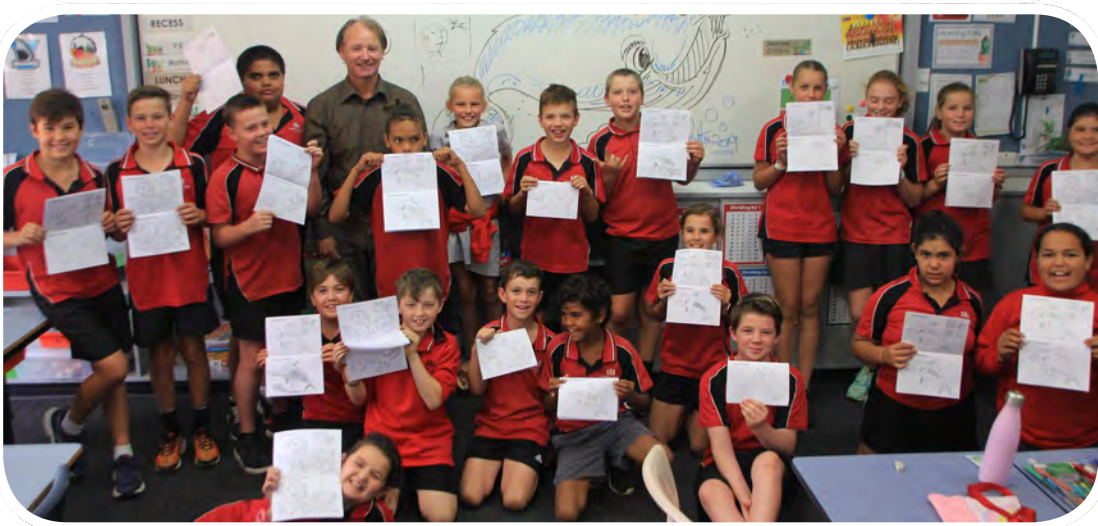
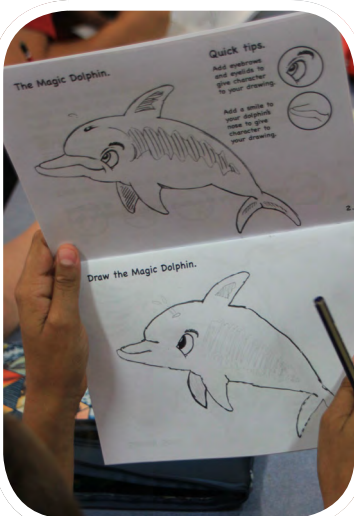




Paul Rutter ARTIST VISIT

Jigsaw Table

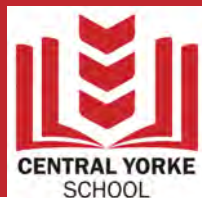
A big thank you to Wayne Hann for making the new jigsaw table in the Community Library. The top can be removed so that the table can be packed away without moving the jigsaw.
