We have been in continual contact with SA Health and SAPOL to have the bus reinstated. At this point in time we are really encouraging students to be attending school if they are able to.

PROGRAMS RESTARTING

It's been fantastic to see that we have been able to recommence our football program as well as SAASTA and Senior School lesson offerings to other sites. The music academy is looking to recommence sometime in the next fortnight or so. The return to a bit of normality has been welcomed by both staff and students.

SCHOOL UPGRADES

As was announced by the Marshall Government in the media last week, Central Yorke have been able to secure over \$200,000 in government funding to upgrade our infrastructure. These funds were approved through our building plans to replace the roof, guttering and downpipes on our Secondary Wing. Over the last 5 years we have spent over \$1.5 million to upgrade the school and bring it up to a standard that is suitable

for cutting edge learning. Future plans are to upgrade our security with electronic locks as well as upgrade furniture throughout our classrooms.

Why does he need special attention? Due to an udder disease called mastitis, his mum was no longer able to feed him and so she rejected him.


How is he getting fed? He is getting fed by a milk formula in a bottle with special teats.

How is he getting fed? Just like Tom, he is getting fed by a milk formula through a bottle with special teats.


How can you tell he is Jerry? If you look at his height you will notice that Jerry is smaller. He will also come to you first when you call.

Quite a few of our 10-12 students are involved with the led steer program for 2020.


Cancellation of the Adelaide Royal Show has meant some big changes in the judging and parading.

R/1 Music **High and Low**

he R/1 students have been investigating the concepts of high and low pitch in music.

We have been learning the 'Noah Rap' and pretending to be little mice and monkeys with high voices and big bears and lions with low voices. We've also chosen instruments to match our voices

We've learned the 'Slide Song' which has a simple scale pattern that climbs from low to high. We've performed this on different instruments including Boomwhackers and handbells. We performed the song in the PAC then stood on the steps of the bus-bay and played it again.



We've learned that big instruments (like big animals) often make low sounds and small instruments (like small animals) often have high sounds.

In later lessons students will apply those concepts to compose music for Jack climbing the Giant's beanstalk.

The Year 2/3/4 class has been exploring how data can be represented in different ways. We looked at how flags can be used to communicate messages, either by themselves (such as a country's flag or a sports flag) or as part of a group.

We then investigated how sailors use maritime flags to send messages. We learned that each flag can stand for a different number or letter of the alphabet and can be put in order to make words.









From there we made our own miniature maritime flags, cutting out small squares of card, colouring them with the correct colours and attaching them to masts.

Each student finished by arranging their flags to make a message and 'send' it across the classroom where it was decoded or replied to.


