NAPLAN

This term sees the carrying out of the of the NAPLAN, National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy on May the 15th, 16th & 17th. All students in years 3, 5, 7, & 9 are sitting this year's test. So what are they, and why do we do them?

It is an obvious goal that every child should be numerate and be able to read, write and spell at an appropriate level. The National Assessment Program is an ongoing program of assessments to monitor progress towards the National Goals for Schooling in the Twenty First Century.

The data from these test results gives schools and systems the ability to compare their students' achievements with national benchmarks and with student achievement in other States and Territories.

Standards described by the benchmarks for Yrs 3, 5 and 7 represent increasingly demanding levels of proficiency against which progress of students through school can be followed. They form important markers along a continuum of increasing competence.

Our site has shown considerable improvement in NAPLAN in the past 4 years, but we will continue to spend considerable





time analysing the results of these tests, to support us in improving the literacy & numeracy of both individuals and groups of students.

School Improvements.

As you can see when you make your way along Junction Road you will see 7 new signs that represent our school values as well as our curriculum specialisations at Central Yorke School. They look great and showcase the learning that happens every day at Central Yorke. You will also see a bit of a facelift in the front office as we have expanded this area and put a new bench in. For me, the look of our school directly reflects the standards that we all hold ourselves accountable to.

The pride we take in the look of our school also represents the pride we take in educating our students and the pride they take in achieving great results.


John Howard once said "I have never seen a good looking school get bad results". For us the improvement journey for our students is far from over. Each day we try to be a bit better than yesterday.

The students' artwork reflects heartfelt sentiment, a respect for the Anzac tradition and a range of artistic skills, imagination and styles.
























20 Years of Community Involvement





English

Teaching programs are designed to balance and integrate the strands to develop students skills in listening, reading, viewing speaking, writing and creating.

Year 1 Achievement Standard

By the end of Year 1, students:

- understand how characters in texts are developed and give reasons for personal preferences
- interact in pair, group and class discussions, taking turns when responding

Year 2 Achievement Standard

By the end of Year 2, students can:

- create texts, drawing on their own experiences, their imagination and information they have learnt.
- use a variety of strategies to engage in group and class discussions and make presentations
- The study of English is central to the learning and development of all young Australians. It helps create confident communicators, imaginative thinkers and informed citizens.

'True Colours' Program

n Tuesday 30th April, Neil Davis, who established the Sammy D Foundation visited Central Yorke School to deliver a 90 minute presentation to the Year 6 and 7 classes. Neil is the father of Sam Davis who was killed tragically after a senseless violent act in 2008.

The Impact Presentation delivered by Neil is the first part of the program that sets the scene for a student led inquiry into bullying and violence and its devastating impact on all involved. The program will be facilitated by home group teachers Hannah Clift and Jaynelle Le Feuvre over the next 8 weeks.

The students engaged respectfully during the presentation and participated enthusiastically in all of the activities during the session.

The name 'True Colours' reflects the critical moment a decision is made whether to engage in, or react to a bullying or violent situation. At that moment what are your true colours? Will you walk away? Will you stop a mate? Will you say no to bullying and violence!

As a matter of interest, two of the Sammy D Foundation ambassadors are Sasha Glasgow and Sam Jacobs from the Yorke Peninsula!

Health and Physical Education provides students with an experiential curriculum that is contemporary, relevant, challenging and physically active.


Along with the development of Movement and Physical Activity there is a strong focus on Personal, Social and Community health.

Year 7/8 Achievement Standard

- apply personal and social skills to establish and maintain respectful relationships and promote safety, fair play and inclusivity.
- demonstrate skills to make informed decisions, and propose and implement actions that promote their own and others' health, safety and wellbeing.
- Students need to be resilient. to develop empathy and to be actively engaged in their own and others' wellbeing, using health, safety and physical activity resources for the benefit of themselves and their communities.

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NAPLAN Online – information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process - it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What is assessed?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

In 2019 most students across Australia will sit NAPLAN online.

Feedback in the first year of NAPLAN Online showed that students engaged well with online assessments. One of the main benefits of NAPLAN Online is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test automatically adapts to a student's test performance. The test presents questions of higher or lower complexity, depending on a student's performance.

Tailored (or adaptive) testing is designed to assess a wider range of student abilities and to measure student achievement more precisely. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions more challenging than usual; they may be taking a more complex test pathway. A student's overall NAPLAN score is based on the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly.

NAPLAN Online is not a test of keyboard skills. There are variations in how fast and well a student can type – just as there are variations in how fast and well a student can write by hand. Year 3 students will complete the writing test on paper.

How can I help my child prepare?

Help your child prepare by reassuring them that NAPLAN is just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply try their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance. Ensuring students are familiar with using devices, typing on them and navigating through programs are a part of student learning and a requirement of the Australian Curriculum from the first year at school.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of coaching providers. NAPLAN is about assessing learning progress in literacy and numeracy.

Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

In 2019, your child will sit the NAPLAN online tests. However, children in some other schools across Australia will sit the NAPLAN paper tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that all schools will move online by 2020. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online.

As students are assessed on the same literacy and numeracy curriculum content, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats can be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale. To find out more about NAPLAN Online, visit nap.edu.au
