It is imperative that our Year 12's take this opportunity to prepare and hone their skills before the end of year. We are always looking for extra tutors to help our students achieve above and beyond.

PUPIL FREE DAY: MONDAY 6TH JUNE

A reminder to all students & parents that we will be having a Pupil Free Day Monday 6th June. On this day we will be working with all schools in our Southern Yorke Partnership looking at development of teacher's ability to use and integrate technology through their curriculum.

ATTENDANCE

I am proud to say that currently our school attendance is sitting at 90%, while it is still 5% short of the DECD target; it is a 7% increase on our attendance last year.

Mr Salmon's and Miss Derrington's 4/5's are leading the way with an attendance rate of 95%, followed closely by Mrs Westbrook's class with 94%.

It is disappointing to see our Year 11 and 12's with an attendance rate of 78%. I will be meeting with each of the Year 12's over

the next few weeks to see where they are headed and how best they can achieve their educational goals.

I can't stress enough how important it is to come to school every day on time. We (families and the school) need to work together to help students to understand the importance of being at school whenever possible, and that trivial reasons for absence are not sufficient to discharge parents' legal responsibilities.

In today's global society, our students aren't just competing against their classmates for jobs, but the entire world.

SCHOOL APP

Maitland Area School now have their own app as a form of 24/7 communication with our school community. It also provides an avenue for parents to provide information to the school re change of details and absences.

ATTENDANCE AND STUDY

Maitland Area School encourages excellence in all subject areas and for our senior students, terms 2 and 3 represent a major part of their workload for the year.

It is important that students are supported through this period, particularly our year 12's who now have less than six months of formal schooling left.

Attendance is a key factor in being successful in completing the SACE. Missing one day per week will see students missing over a month of schooling for the rest of the year, time which is extremely difficult to catch up.

If a student is absent then it is important to let the school know of the reason for the absence, and also to work with teaching staff to catch up the work that has been missed.

HOMEWORK

Homework is also critical in achieving the highest grades possible. All year levels will have some homework set throughout the week. Please check your children's diaries to see what work is required and when it is due. By the time a student reaches year 12 they should be completing about three hours of homework per night, just to keep up with all of their course requirements. This will allow them to meet deadlines and to revise and prepare thoroughly for assessment tasks.

PUNCTUALITY

A reminder also that the school day starts at 8:50 am. Home class period is an important part of the day which establishes routines and allows staff to pass on information to students. Even being 5 minutes late disrupts these routines and impacts on the start to the day. If students are arriving late, or leaving early during the day, they are required to report to the front office with an explanation. Staff will be following up unexplained absences and irregular attendances. We have started to implement extra strategies to help our students be successful and I look forward to discussing these as they are rolled out.

Our students were tested both physically and mentally, being assessed on a variety of skills including distance paddling, techniques such as sweep, support, and draw strokes, emergency stops, capsizing, deep water and Eskimo rescues and their overall independence and initiation of tactics.

Our students, Anna Falco, Ben Colliver, Jakkeb Marshall, Reuben Parker, Georgie Robinson, Ezra Glazbrook and Luke Clifford, thoroughly enjoyed the three day experience. They each met the criteria required of them as a result of working collaboratively in various scenarios and showing great determination and perseverance in all practical tasks.

In addition, they represented our school with upmost respect towards their instructors, teachers and of course each other. I couldn't have been more proud of their overall contribution, endeavour and morale over the three days.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

This year our Year 2/3 class were loaned recorders and recorder books. The Year 5 students have saxes, flutes, trumpets, trombones and clarinets. Older students have hired similar instruments. All are having tuition and many are involved in class ensembles, year level bands and the Concert Band.

But despite the teaching time, financial commitment from school and families, there's a missing element that would increase students' ability, progress and enjoyment: practice!

By enabling push notifications, you can receive alerts from the school. These alerts can be <u>customised</u> so you only receive those relevant to your child or children.


To set your alert choices:


