Well done to the Central Yorke SAASTA girls team who won the 2018 Power Cup and the boys' team who finished runners up for the second year in a row..


Although we didn't win the most games we were the highest scoring academy in regards to the academic and attendance streams. I am so proud to see our ATSI students doing so well at their study.

ecently many children have been arriving to our preschool and school extremely tired, for a whole variety of reasons. This has resulted in some of them being very teary and irritable before their day of learning even begins.

Medically backed advice states that children of this age group require between 10–12 hours of sleep per night to be able to function and develop properly.

After School Football

From the start of this term I've been running Aussie Rules sessions on Wednesday afternoons from 3:45–4:30pm for any interested children living at Point Pearce. The average attendance per session has been 18 children, boys and girls varying in ages from Reception to Middle School. Some basic fitness and skill sessions are taught, followed by some goal shooting and then a 'scratch match' between two teams. In the short time they have been



running, I have noticed a big improvement in student confidence and skills and have seen children working better in team situations. All students are welcome. Fundraising for Nepal


In past years we've used the musical as an opportunity to not only raise students' awareness of life in other countries but to raise money for less privileged communities.

GOAL

We want to raise \$451 to purchase solar panels for the 'Happiness Home Orphanage'* in Katmandu, Nepal

ACTIVITY

We're going to walk up the Ardrossan Road into Maitland multiple times to reach the equivalent of 8,586m, the height of KANCHENJUNGA, the world's third highest mountain***.

SPONSORSHIP

We're asking families to sponsor students a small amount for each time they reach the top of the hill. We expect most climbers to complete 3-4 circuits in the time. 50c-\$1 per circuit would be appropriate.

Climbing Kanchenjunga

To assist this valuable work, and in particular support the schooling of the children we plan to not only donate some of the musical's profits but to also hold a fundraiser on Friday June 29.

On that day we're going to attempt to climb Kanchenjunga's height: a whopping 8,586m!


Since we don't have a handy mountain nearby, we're going to instead climb the more leisurely slope of the Ardrossan Hill into Maitland.

Starting at the bottom on the southern side, we're going to trek up through the verdant forest of pine trees (thank you Judith Davies!) and 23m change in elevation until we emerge at the top on the golf course. Then we're going to head back down and do it again. And again...

All up, we'll have to complete 373 laps to make it to the equivalent of Kanchenjunga's summit. But with 100 students participating, each student will just need to make it four times.


Next week we'll send home information with students regarding times, clothing and sponsorship details.






Nationally Consistent Collection of Data

School Students with Disability

Dear Parents,

All schools are required to collect information about the numbers of students that they provide adjustments to under the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and Disability Standards of Education (2005). From 2018, this data will be used as the basis for national funding.

The NCCD involves the collection of;

- the number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students
- · the level of adjustment provided to students
- student's type of disability if known

Under the model the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficulties, health and mental health conditions.

If your child is identified for inclusion in the Collection, the required information will be included in this year's data collection.
