# ACE Artists Inspire Future Creators

**C**entral Yorke School students were treated to an inspiring visit from artists Lara Tilbrook, Uncle Peter Turner, and Crista Bradshaw, presented by Adelaide Contemporary Experimental (ACE). The visiting artists spoke about art as both a career pathway and a meaningful way to connect with culture, nature, and personal passions.

Uncle Peter shared an impressive collection of artefacts and spoke about native plants and cultural burnings, while Lara demonstrated how she incorporates natural materials into her creations, from hand-dyed yarns to wearable art made from gum nuts and echidna quills. Students were captivated by the range of ideas, materials, and techniques the artists shared.

The visit was part of a continuing partnership with ACE, which also includes the Future Studios Program. This year, four CYS students had the exciting opportunity to spend a week at ACE's Adelaide studio, developing their skills alongside contemporary artists Lara Tilbrook, Bryce Cawte, Brad Darkson, and the Mardawi Aboriginal Corporation. Their work will be showcased in the Future Studios: 2025 Exhibition, opening Saturday 18 October at the ACE Gallery, Lion Arts Centre in Adelaide.

Congratulations to our young artists on this outstanding achievement — we couldn't be prouder of their creativity and dedication.



# WHAT IS the ACE IFC program?

Adelaide Contemporary Experimental (ACE) is an organization in Adelaide that offers workshops and programs for artists, including secondary school students.

They provide practical workshops, such as the "Material Experimentation" series, to support student artists in exploring creative techniques and professional practice. Additionally, ACE runs programs like Future Studios which provides young artists with studio time and mentoring.




# Aquatics Camp

# Changing the Face of Men's Health

Rhys represents Movember - and CYS - in Geneva.

**M**ovember is the leading global charity changing the face of men's health. Too many fathers, husbands, brothers, uncles and mates have been lost too soon, so the movement continues to raise awareness and fund life-changing projects that tackle mental health, suicide prevention, prostate cancer and testicular cancer.

## Youth Action Council

Since 2003, Movember has funded more than 1,250 men's health projects worldwide, uniting communities everywhere to have fun while doing good. One such project is the inaugural Youth Action Council — and we're proud that Rhys Heinrich has been part of it. Rhys brought an incredible perspective to every conversation (and rocked a pretty solid upper-lip caterpillar too!), speaking up for rural and remote communities that are often under-resourced and face unique challenges.

## Global Model Forum

Earlier this year, Movember announced an opportunity for one Youth Action Council member from Australia, the UK, and Canada to represent the organisation at the World Health Organisation Global Model Forum in Geneva. Out of nine submissions, Rhys was selected to be Movember's representative. His creative submission stood out to judges — complete with a clever country twist, using a roller as a camera stand and a backdrop of crops.

Rhys attended the five-day forum in Geneva with his mum, where he tackled global health issues and connected with international experts and professionals. Movember has expressed immense pride in having Rhys represent Australian communities on the world stage, as we do for representing CYS.



Wearing red and learning vital safety lessons in honour of Daniel Morcombe

Students across CYS took part in the national Day for Daniel, a day dedicated to remembering Daniel Morcombe and promoting child safety awareness.

Students had to guess which allergy-friendly option they were sampling – a fun and educational way to build awareness about food allergies and inclusivity in cooking!




## 7/8 PE

These models will now be used to investigate how quickly and widely the plague spread, and the factors that contributed to it. The project showcased outstanding creativity, teamwork and historical understanding from everyone involved.



## 7/8 Literacy

Year 7/8 students explore settings for narrative writing with an excursion across YP

Miss Caputo's Year 7/8 class enjoyed a day exploring key locations across the Yorke Peninsula as part of their English narrative writing unit on setting.

The first stop was **Port Victoria**, where students reflected on their surroundings using their five senses before walking along the jetty in calm, sunny conditions. At **Butler's Farm**, the group was welcomed by the Butler family and took in the sights and sounds of the working property, surrounded by green fields and farm machinery.

The next destination was the **Moonta Mines**, where students explored the historic stone buildings and imagined life in the past before enjoying recess in the nearby park.

The excursion concluded at **Kadina**, where students completed their final sensory reflection and enjoyed some free play at the playground.

The hands-on experiences helped students understand how to describe real-world settings using sight, sound, smell, touch and taste — skills they are now applying to their creative writing.

## Exploring Brazil

Students cook up flavour and confidence in the kitchen

Miss Parker's Travel Guides took to the newly renovated kitchen last week to explore the vibrant flavours of Brazil, trialling a range of traditional recipes.

**Shannon** and **Anabel** collaborated to create pastéis de carne — a popular Brazilian street food made with spiced beef, herbs and spices encased in crispy pastry. They worked carefully to fold and fry each pastel to perfection — and though they were a little spicy for some, they were a hit!

**Shannon** and **Rovina** also prepared a fresh gremolata garnish of parsley, garlic and lemon to complement the dish. **Telika** worked independently to make brigadeiros — rich chocolate truffles made from condensed milk and cocoa — ensuring each was mixed to the right consistency and coated in sprinkles.

**Kirene** and **Rovina** made a white chocolate version rolled in coconut, which proved just as popular.

Students have come a long way since starting the Travel Guides project, developing confidence in following recipes, using equipment and experimenting with flavours from around the world.






