ongratulations to the staff and the students on our NAPLAN results. This year we have seen the best NAPLAN results for quite some time. Our Year 3 students were off the charts and our improvement from our Year 7 – 9's was unbelievable. Our average outperformed the state average in most cases and most students saw growth.

Our challenge now is to make sure that we keep improving our curriculum and teaching strategies to set the bar higher and maintain our students in the higher bands.

We are also looking at new intervention and improvement strategies for those students who didn't achieve SEA targets. It is critical that we now see this as the norm and strive to improve on these results each year to build the academic reputation of our school.

### HOW TO GIVE YOUR CHILD SUCCESS

"Children in middle class families are estimated to have experienced some 100 hours of being read to when they enter school, compared with 25 hours of reading time provided in low income families"

Finding time to regularly read a book together can make sure your child is ready to read and more successful at school.

Come and visit the school library and borrow books together, read a recipe or TV guide, read signs in the cars on shops in the magazines, talk about reading and books, get then to read off the internet or print out and read.

For older children get them to read out aloud to you on a regular basis, or when grandparents, uncles and aunties come over.

Any or all of these things will make a difference not only to your child's literacy but also numeracy and most other areas of study.



#### **GREAT START WEBSITE**

The Great Start Website is an innovative website that provides parents of young children with activities to improve their child's numeracy and literacy skills.

activities centred around everyday activities including Play, Food, Out and About, Growing, Getting Ready and Celebrations.

The website incorporates findings from the

national Engaging Families in Early Child Development Story initiative. It includes neuroscience research. the importance of identifying key messages to communicate to parents, research on parent perceptions of numeracy and literacy and research into effective social marketing campaigns that result in parent behaviour change.

Activities are searchable by age, materials and the skills developed.

The Great Start website offers parents of children aged under five years valuable learning resources including games and activities based on everyday experiences.


#### SUBJECT COUNSELLING

Ultimate Frisbee expert Rex Johnson came to visit our SAASTA Academy last week to help the team brush up on their skills. Students will be competing in an Ultimate Frisbee competition in Term 4 as a part of the SAASTA Shield carnival.



#### WHAT IS ULTIMATE FRISBEE?

**Ultimate frisbee**, is a non-contact team sport originally played by players with a flying disc (frisbee).

Points are scored by passing the disc to a teammate in the opposing end zone.

Other basic rules are that players must not take steps while holding the disc, and interceptions, incomplete passes, and passes out of bounds are turnovers. Rain, wind, or occasionally other adversities can make for a testing match with rapid turnovers, heightening the pressure of play. From its beginnings in the late 1960s,

the game has resisted empowering any referee with rule enforcement, instead relying on the sportsmanship of players and invoking the "spirit of the game" to maintain fair play. Players call their own fouls, and dispute a foul only when they genuinely believe it did not occur.

#### **INCLEMENT WEATHER**

We'd initially planned to plant the trees back in week 1 of term, but the site was washed out with heavy rains over several days. We rescheduled for the following week and then rescheduled again when the site was, once again, flooded.

The wait until week 4 was definitely worth it, as the day dawned sunny, a little cool, but with no clouds in sight.

#### LEARNING ON THE JOB

We arrived at the site just after 9am and had a brief introduction to successful tree planting which included being careful removing the tree from its plastic tube, making sure the seedling was level with the ground once planted, techniques for ensuring a tight wind break and a demonstration of the optimum amount of fertiliser to add.

Mr Salmon's students were attentive, receptive and polite during the demonstration and asked relevant and thoughtful questions.

#### **PLANT THOSE TREES!**

Students broke into pairs and groups of three and began the job. Some had brought their own trowels and rakes while other students used those provided by the council.

Groups worked quickly but carefully and we were soon starting a second section of plantings.

We had a quick look at trees planted by previous groups, discussed the issues with erosion from water run off and finished with a group photo around and on the work ute.
