NIGHTAIMUSEUM



he Maitland Museum hosted over two hundred visitors on the evening of August 21 for Central Yorke School's 2019 Project Based Learning Expo.

The aptly named 'Night At the Museum' showcased student learning around the theme of local history with families viewing firsthand the practical and research based projects students had been working on throughout the term.

To accommodate the projects the museum's meeting room was transformed into an exhibition gallery with Kindy through Year 9 classes work mounted around the room.

Maitland Model

Centre stage was an ambitious model of Maitland constructed by the Year 6 class complete with scannable Internet links to historic information researched by the Year 8 class. This was supplemented by the



Year 4 class's old and new photos of the town and the Year 5 student's research at the Maitland Cemetery.

Stump-Jump Ploughs

The Kindy students project focused on the stump-jump plough while the Year 1 students had interviewed grandparents and written their own history book. Several classes worked with the museum itself, with the Year 3 students creating museum scavenger hunts and Year 5 students working on the restoration of the museum gate.

ANZAC Spirit

Year 7 students researched how popular pastimes and activities had changed and the Year 9 class showcased their award winning Premier's ANZAC Spirit Prize essays and research.



Elsewhere in the museum the Year 1's had set up a photo booth and using their photography skills had a brisk evening charging a gold coin donation for professional portraits.

Official Opening

The official opening of the evening was held at 7pm with the school's Senior Vocal Ensemble under conductor Debbie Schwartz leading the singing of the school hymn in the old school grounds. This was followed by the song 'Another Page of





History' which emphasised the historic contributions made by 'everyday' people and was accompanied by a huge montage of local historic photos projected onto the wall of the museum.

A sausage sizzle run by the school, tea and coffee provided by the National Trust Committee and slice and cakes made by the Home Economics students all raised additional funds for the museum which also received a \$500 donation from the school.





The unique evening was well received with older visitors reminiscing about past school-days and many expressing surprise at the expansive museum collections.

Museum staff were very happy with the evening, posting on social media to say "Thank you so much for an amazing evening and all the hard work done by the students to make the evening such a huge success."

Keeping On, Keeping On

But Talisha didn't give up.

With assistance and support from Whitelion she continued to work towards her goals and two weeks ago she received a call from the Army Indigenous Development Program enquiring on her fitness and willingness to join the Program in the Northern Territory for six months.

Was she still keen to give it a go?



Of course she was, and last Monday Talisha got the call from the Army nurse who said she had been accepted into the program! and someone from the Army would call her to inform her of the details.

Talisha called me as her case manager to relay the exciting news. She said she could not stop smiling but had better get off the phone and call her Mum and Dad!

The whirlwind of news continued with Talisha receiving a call from the Army Indigenous Program Officer congratulating her on being accepted and informing her she was leaving for Darwin on Thursday!

The Program

The ADFA Program is residential and designed to assist applicants in achieving the prerequisite requirements to enter the Army as a recruit. The process will introduce her to the Army culture, improve her academic foundations, and provide her with the skills, knowledge, attitude and confidence to be an effective soldier. Talisha's accommodation, meals and all

medical are funded by the Army and she will also receive an Army income throughout this time

Within three days of finding out Talisha had left her hometown and family and headed to Darwin for the opportunity of a lifetime. Nervous but excited, Talisha knew she had support behind her to assist her with achieving this big step.

I am so very proud of this young lady and what she is about to embark on and achieve. She is a real inspiration to not only her own community and culture but showing all young people that perseverance and courage can lead you to great opportunities.




Spotlight On


Youth Opportunities graduates may also apply for a range of school based scholarships worth up to \$1,500 in the form of career guidance, financial assistance, and academic support.



Carly Ryan Foundation Fact Sheets | SnapChat

Each fortnight we will be highlighting a popular online application. This week's fact sheet from the Carly Ryan Foundation is Snapchat.

Snapchat is a hugely popular messaging app with young people throughout the world

SNAPCHAT



Age Rating in the App Store:

Snapchat is a popular messaging app that lets users exchange pictures and videos (called snaps) designed to disappear after they're viewed.

How does it work?

On Snapchat, users go by a handle. To add friends, you can upload your contacts, search for people you know or use the 'Quick Add' feature of add friends of friends or strangers easily. You can also automatically add someone by taking a picture of their "Snapcode," a special QR code unique to each user.

To begin a conversation every Snap starts with a photo or video. Snapchatters can layer text, emojis, doodles, and more on top, and choose how long they want the Snap to be displayed (up to 10 seconds). Then, you can send the Snap to one or more friends. Stories is a feature that lets you string Snaps together into one longer narrative that stays available for 24 hours.

Be mindful who are you sharing images with and always remember that everything on the internet is permanent. Make sure you are happy for potentially anyone to see your snaps and share without permission.

Live Stories

Live Stories are compilations of Snaps submitted by Snapchatters from events and locations around the world. Discover allows you to explore channels from established publishers who curate their own content. The Discover screen in Snapchat also includes a selection of the day's Live Stories.

Video and Text Chat

Snapchat also allows for one-on-one chat. Like Snaps, chats are cleared when a recipient leaves the Chat screen. But you always have the option to save a message you'd like to keep.

Lenses, Filters and Stickers

There are many ways to customise the look of your Snaps. Lenses add real-time special effects and sounds to a Snap. Filters offer different design overlays. Geo-filters are a popular way to customise your Snap at specific locations or events around the world. Stickers are colourful images and cartoons that give you additional ways to share content.

Memories

Memories is a private collection of the Snaps and Stories that you choose to save and that don't disappear. You can use Memories to create new Stories and Snaps. You can also choose to store certain Memories in the password-protected "My Eyes Only" section, which is an important feature for parents to be aware of.

Snapcash

Snapchat's payment feature is not for users under 18, but you should know about it so nobody "borrows" your debit card to pay someone back or receive money via Snapchat. Snapchat partnered with Square Inc., to enable users to link their Snapchat and debit card accounts to be able to make peer-to-peer payments for things like paying someone back for lunch.

Spectactles

Spectacles consists of sunglasses with a built-in video camera. The glasses light up to show that you are taking a Snap, this may not be obvious to everyone at first so if your kids are using Spectacles, talk with them about protecting other people's privacy by asking permission before recording them. You can connect the glasses directly to a phone via Bluetooth or WiFi to add videos to Memories.

Challenges

Snapchat is the number one application used for 'sexting' or 'sending nudes' between underage people. Users must be mindful of the social and legal consequences of sending images like these. If the user is under 18 years old it is illegal for them to produce, distribute or possess these types of images.

Child abuse pictures are illegal if they are:

- asked for;
- taken:
- received and kept; or
- sent, posted or passed around

The maximum penalty for sharing child abuse material can be up to 15 years in jail this includes an offenders details placed on the sex offender register.
