

### Week 8 - 'R U OK?' Day

The R-2 Class at Point Pearce held some activities on 'R U OK? Day', Thursday September 12th. They talked about asking people if they were OK when they could see that they might be looking sad or lonely.

The children practiced this. The children were dressed in R U OK/ yellow tops, and enjoyed a sausage sizzle as well. The children also put a 'Helping Hand' print each onto a card in the Cultural Centre to be displayed.



### **Week 9 - New Street Signs**

During Week 9 a set of ordered miniature street signs arrived. Miss Bec had children work in pairs with her to construct them. With the small teams there was lots of screwing, holding and bolting of parts to build them. They are going to be used by

our children out in the paved front yard area where we already have roads painted, to assist our children learn about road safety. We hope to have other Kindy and Junior Primary children from the Maitland Campus come and access our Road Safety facilities as well.





### Week 10 - Commissioner Visit

On Thursday September 26, the Commissioner for Aboriginal Children and Young People, April Lawrie and her team visited CYS Maitland Campus. The purpose was for them to talk with Aboriginal children and families about issues that really mattered to them. Every ATSI student at Maitland Campus and some of the older children from Point Pearce Campus were

involved in a series of activities which were designed to get the group thinking about what it means to be an Aboriginal child/adolescent within this and the wider community; and where they saw areas of concern and how these might be addressed. Another major focus was on how important it was to be proud of your Aboriginality and Cultural Heritage. This was one of many such workshops across South Australia, with follow ups to these being planned.



# n the 15th of September, the Women's Aboriginal AFL Academy got to experience a once in a lifetime opportunity.

We were lucky enough to travel to the APY lands to visit some communities.

Myself and Miss Vince were the only people to go from Central Yorke School and we both felt extremely privileged.

On Sunday we flew to Alice Springs where it was very hot and windy and waited for our next flight to Uluru. After landing we went sightseeing then drove five hours along a very rocky road to get to Umuwa where we camped for the rest of the trip.

The next morning we had an early start. We got up at 6 in the morning and split off into two groups. Each group visited 2 schools that day to run a workshop about healthy eating. Firstly, my

group visited a school at Pip where we split off into class groups. Joyce and Myself along with Miss Vince went and worked with the kindy students and helped them with counting to 10.

On the third day we visited Amata school and the students were very excited to see some new friendly faces. First, we were in the classrooms helping the students read. After they finished their books, we were called into the other classrooms to talk about healthy eating and ran some football drills for the students.

This was very engaging for the kids and allowed us to get to know each other better.

. Wednesday was an eye opening experience as we focused on the cultural aspect of the camp. We had an elder from the Ernabella community take us looking for honey ants with his wife. The process of finding these honey ants was very long and tiring.



### **Ernabella Fact File**

- Ernabella is 1,374.5 km from Adelaide along the National Highway.
- The town had a population of 412 in the 2016 census
- It was established in 1938.
- The area is prone to earthquakes, one of few areas of Australia to have experienced multiple large earthquakes in recorded history.



Eventually with determination we finally found them and we soon found that it was definitely worth the wait.

We also looked for witchetty grubs, but for many reasons, I decided to pass on this nutritious snack!

On Thursday morning we left to go to Ernabella and set up for the sports carnival that we were running for all of the communities in the APY lands. This included about 350 students and many community members

The day was full of fun activities such as javelin, shotput, high jump and for the younger kids we had set up basketball games, hip hop dancing and football drills.

Later on in the day the students came together to finish off the sports carnival with a colour run. This was very exciting for the kids and also for teachers who joined in.

That night we headed to the Ernabella school ready for the Dance Carnival. Each school performed dances with a cultural component and made it difficult for judges to choose a winner.



To finish off the night we all got together and made a huge dance circle. On the Friday we made the trek back through some crazy dust storms.

This camp allowed many people involved to make life-long friends and was an inspiring experience. It is definitely something I will remember for a very long time and I hope that I am able to go back in the future.



# **CALCULATOR%**



The calculator% app is an application that is designed to help the user hide photos and videos behind the applications screen.

This application appears to look like a calculator, but upon entering a passcode it opens up a private vault where files are stored securely and cannot be viewed in the iPhone or Androids default camera role.

### To get files into your Private Calculator

In the app itself, you can tap the '+' sign to select Wi-Fi transfer, which gives you an IP address to type on your computer's web browser. You can also import files through your camera roll (photo's and videos).

Private Calculator can display and open a number of media types, including photo's (such as .jpeg, .gif, .bmp and .png files), videos (.mp4, .avi, .mkv, .wmv, .flv), music and audiobooks (.mp3), Microsoft Office files (.doc, .xls, .ppt), other assorted documents (.txt, .pdf) and even downloaded websites (.htm).

### Challenges

Some of the concerns regarding this app are the fact that your child might potentially be hiding explicit photos, videos or other content.

If your child is under 18 years old it is illegal for them to produce, distribute or possess these types of images.

Child abuse pictures are illegal if they are:

- o asked for:
- o taken:
- o received and kept; or
- o sent, posted or passed around

The maximum penalties for child abuse material can be up to 15 years in jail and being placed on the sex offender register. The maximum penalty for an act of indecency is 2 years in jail if the person in the picture is under 16. If the person is over 16, the maximum penalty is 18 months in jail.

### What can parents do to keep their kids safe on calculator% app?

- Consider deleting this app
- Remind your kids that everything is public
- Have a dialog with your kids about sexting and sending inappropriate photos to others
- Explain to your kids that they should be careful with sharing their photos with anyone, as they can be forwarded

It is important to have open honest communication with your child regarding sexting.

We always encourage open conversations around privacy and personal safety.

# **FACEBOOK**



Facebook is a social networking service where millions of people go to interact with others. Facebook has over one billion active users, more than half of them use Facebook on a mobile device. The user can create a personal profile with photos, lists of personal interests, contact information, and other personal information which is shared among their chosen friends.

Facebook users have the ability to interact with a wide range of individuals. Through Facebook's news feed, users have the ability to interact in public conversations with people who are not within their friends list.

### How to make your Facebook profile private

### Step 1

- 1 Click on the three parallel lines at the bottom right corner of the screen.
- 2 Scroll to the bottom and click the 'Settings & Privacy' tab and click 'Settings'.
- 3 Click on the Timeline and Tagging option. You can control everything with regards to who gets to post and tag on your Timeline and also who can see it. Go through all seven options and customise it for you. Activating Timeline review is also recommended. Once you've done this your Timeline will only be viewable to the people you choose to look at it.

### Step 2

Go to the 'Privacy' tab in the settings page. Facebook offers you several different options so you can adjust exactly how private you want to be. Check your privacy settings regularly. Often when Facebook updates the settings may go back to public by default.

### Other Privacy Settings

To manage your privacy on Facebook (on a computer), access the privacy settings by clicking on the downward facing arrow in the upper right-hand side of the page and select 'Settings'. In the left hand column, click on 'Privacy'.

To access these settings on a mobile device select the three lines on the bottom right of your screen. Scroll down to 'Settings & Privacy'. Here you can change a number of settings: Restricting who can see the users profile and timeline.

Under the 'Who can see my stuff?' section, users can manage who is able to access their timeline and profile. Next to 'Who can see your future posts?', click on 'Edit' to ensure that 'Friends' is selected.

### How can I report a fake profile?

If you have a Facebook account and want to report someone that's pretending to be you or someone you know:

- Go to the profile of the impersonating account.
- Click on the cover photo and select Report.
- Follow the on-screen instructions for impersonation to file a report.

### How do I block another user on Facebook?

- Click at the top right of any Facebook page.
- Click Privacy Shortcuts.
- O Click 'How do I stop someone from bothering me?'
- Enter the name of the person you want to block and
- Select the specific person you want to block from the list that appears and click Block again.
