Remembrance Day

riginally called
Armistice Day, this day
commemorated the end
of the hostilities for the
Great War (World War I), the signing
of the armistice, which occurred on
11 November 1918 - the 11th hour
of the 11th day of the 11th month.
Armistice Day was observed by the
Allies as a way of remembering
those who died, especially soldiers
with 'no known grave'.

At Central Yorke School we observed one minute's silence just before 11.00 am to remember the sacrifice of those who died or otherwise suffered in Australia's cause in wars and war-like conflicts. Our School was also represented at a special service at the War Memorial.

The service was a reminder to us all of the sacrifices our community made in a time of war. The most

moving part of the service was watching students all bow their heads while listening to the last post for the school. I was so proud to watch one of our own show such a tribute to the fallen heroes.

Our SRC also represented the school and laid a wreath at the Town Memorial.

NAIDOC WEEK AT CENTRAL YORKE

NAIDOC Week celebrates the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The idea behind NAIDOC goes back to a letter written by William Cooper that was aimed at Aboriginal communities and at churches in 1937 as they were preparing for what would become the famous Day of Mourning in 1938. It not only sparked a very effective one-off protest. It also stimulated



a national observance that was at first championed by churches, and is now a national celebration.

On Tuesday we celebrated NAIDOC week with events at the school that included a Colour Run after our SAASTA Connect students won a competition. Our students did an amazing job of immersing themselves in culture and embracing our Aboriginal heritage. The photos show just how much fun was had by all. Thank you to Sonya Rankine, who worked tirelessly to organise this for our students.

Exams have been underway for the last fortnight with students sitting, Mathematical Methods, General Mathematics, Biology, Legal Studies, Chemistry and Psychology exams. This year for the first time we have delivered online E-Exams which have been hugely successful in modernising the way SACE is delivered.

While the focus has been on preparing students for academic success for the last few months it is also a time to reflect on and celebrate the experiences our

students enjoy whilst at CYS, this has included a range of sporting, social and academic options. As I read this year's school leavers' references it became clear that no two students have the same experience of our school and they can really personalise the approach and pathway they take through the SACE.


CYFA Henly High Visit

WELCOME TO COUNTRY

The group was welcomed by Ron Newchurch onto Narungga country in the Cultural Centre, then taken on a tour of the school site by myself. Children in the R-2 Class performed a song with movements about the significance of belonging to Country, and then shared some of their knowledge of Narungga Language.

VISITING THE POINT

The group then went on a drive to the Point, where Ron Newchurch and Kay Lawrence shared their knowledge and experiences about growing up there. We stopped at the Cattle Yards, Dolly's Jetty and Butheras Rock to hear them speak. I read a version of the Butheras Rock Dreaming Story to the group.

Back at the school, the group shared a barbecue lunch with the children at the school, and then returned to the Cultural Centre for a 'Q and A' session.

I shared some resources with the group and gave them each a pack to take home. Once again Kay and Ron were able to share lots of relevant information about the history of Point Pearce.

Joann Weckert our District Director thanked all for both organising and attending on the day, and the important significance of days such as this.

Out of the group, around one third of them had never visited our Community before. We thank them for showing an interest. This type of experience is so important in helping to broaden people's knowledge base, and is an important step towards greater understanding and true Reconciliation.






