


### R/1 Unit 1 | The Gingerbread Man

The R/1 classes finished their Gingerbread Man unit by designing their own 'Gingerbread Man Traps'. We role-played catching an errant cookie in drama then

created our designs on official 'blueprint' paper. Some of the designs were very creative!

**F-2 Skills**: Generate, develop and record design ideas through describing, drawing and modelling.









## **2/3 UNIT 1 | Wired Up** The 2/3 class completed their 'Wired Up'

The 2/3 class completed their 'Wired Up' unit by making their own spectacles using wire. Students had to bend, twist, cut and shape the wire into twin lens holders, make the arms to go over the ears and make sure that there were no pointy wires sticking out so that the glasses were safe to wear.

**3/4 Achievement Standard**: They identify appropriate technologies and techniques and demonstrate safe work practices when producing designed solutions



























### 4/5 Unit 1 | Kites

The 4/5 classes finished their kites unit by making a sled kite. They used a template to cut out the shape on recycled Christmas cellophane kites and reinforced the flaps the bridle joins onto.

Next they cut the bamboo spars to length and taped them in place. They added more reinforcing sticky tape to the edges and made tails from wool and scrap cellophane. Finally, they built a winder and tested the kites outside. Most flew really well!

**5/6 Skills**: Select appropriate materials, components, tools, equipment and techniques and apply safe procedures to make designed solutions













### R/1 Unit 2 | Grandpa's Slippers

The R/1 classes read the story of 'Grandpa's Slippers'. We investigated shoe sizes and practised drawing around the soles of our feet. We traced out our shoes on corrugated





card and cut them out. Then we cut strips of felt to size and attached them to the card so that they would stay on our feet as we moved.



### 2/3 Unit 2 | Tunnels

The 2/3 STEM class is now investigating tunnels. We looked at famous tunnels around the world then made simple tubular tunnels from paper. Next we practised our 'scoring' with scissors and safety rulers to create



crisp folds in corrugated card. We tested the tunnels by driving a small car through them and joined tunnels together to make even longer ones.





### 4/5 Unit 2 | Binary Bracelets

The Year 4/5 classes have moved on now to investigating binary numbers. We changed our initials into binary code, converted the zeroes and ones into colours, then threaded





beads onto a bracelet in the same pattern. We added 'delimiter' colours to separate out the initials so each letter was recognisable.


back in the classroom. Other classes researched artworks on the Internet and designed their own personal responses to the national day.

## Waste Survey

The Year 9 class has been working on an assessment task in HASS to record how much waste we generate as a school. On the 22<sup>nd</sup> of March, our class held a waste disposal unit at recess time to collect waste for our audit. To do this, we walked around the school collecting student and staff waste and disposing of it in one of our five categories. We also interviewed a few people to see what their thoughts are about waste.

- Unopened food (pre-packaged, unopened by students, for example milk carton)
- Food waste (all food can be mixed together for the purpose of this audit)
- Liquid waste (milk, juice, water, soft drink)
- Recyclables (paper, plastic bottles, metal cans, glass bottles)
- Other/landfill (all other waste, such as plastic bags, wrappers etc.)

The day was a massive success as we collected 3.3kg of waste. Another great result was that there wasn't any waste in the unopened food category, which was great to see. This assessment has been fun and informative. Now we can find ways to reduce the amount of waste in our school.








#### **REDUCING YOUR FOOD WASTE:**

The R-2 students were also lucky enough to be invited to join in with the Narungga/Palawa cultural exchange for an afternoon of necklace and bracelet making in the Culture Room.

The Narungga/Palawa Cultural Exchange shell necklace project is a cultural revival program hosted by Point Pearce Aboriginal Community to learn the practice of traditional marieener shell necklace making. The Narungga community invited renowned Palawa artist Aunty Lola Greeno to mentor Narungga women in the shell stringing practice, which is a sleeping cultural practice for the Narungga. 5-day cultural exchange, learning: -

- · collection of shells
- · preparation of shells
- creative and cultural practice of shell necklace
- · bracelet making.

They really enjoyed working with Aunty Sonya and Aunty Lola and were very proud of their creations.

#### **EASTER BUNNY VISIT**

### Nharangga Totem Groups

#### **CLAN GROUPS**

Prior to European colonisation, Nharangga were divided into four 'clan' or 'totem' groups – the Garrdi (emu), Wawi (female red kangaroo), Widhadha (shark) and Wildu (eagle). Nharangga people inherited their totem from their parents. Westerners use the term 'totem' to describe 'structured relationships between human groups and natural species'. Totems represent connection, and relationships between people and their totems are profound and enduring.

#### CONNECTIONS

These connections between humans and animal and plant species, or with other parts of the natural world, overlap and intersect. Not only is every person in connection totemically, but equally importantly, they are in connection to numerous species. The different ways of being connected produce for each person a web of kinship with the natural world.

For example, Nharangga of the emu totem, Garrdi, were connected to each other, to emu people of other Aboriginal groups, to emus and to sites of emu significance. Curramulka, Garrdimalga, is one such site. Garrdimalga translates literally as 'emu white', meaning a limestone water hole where emus come to drink. Stories connected with this waterhole belonged to members of the emu totem who were its custodians

#### TERRITORIAL DIVIDES

The peninsula was territorially divided into north, south, east and west, with each of the four totem groups - the Wawi, Widhadha, Garrdi and Wildu - custodians of their particular territory. People inherited both their territory and their totem from their parents. Although each family group had their own area of land, rights to country were flexible. Elder Tim Hughes stated that, although each group had their own places, Nharangga 'were all in together' and 'others could come along. There were different areas for this, different for that, and some people always hunted up there at the Hummocks, some down the bottom, some near the centre, some other places, but everyone shared special things when the time was right.' Nharangga met at pre-designated places to perform ceremonies and share resources.

#### THE BUTTERFISH

The Gynburra (or Butterfish) is significant to the Narungga people, it is a generous and plentiful source of food and also a term of acknowledgement and identity to the Narungga people as the 'Butterfish Mob'.

- · Adult re-entry students who are completing their SACE.
