Learning Together through Innovative Practice

PLAY-BASED LEARNING IN EARLY YEARS

From the very start, our Early Learning Centre positions play at the heart of learning—guided by the Belonging, Being, Becoming curriculum framework.



Play is recognised as children’s work and nurtured through uninterrupted, thoughtfully resourced indoor and outdoor environments.

Our R-2 classrooms at Point Pearce also incorporate play-infused Investigation Time weekly, weaving story-tables and inquiry provocations to boost oral language and social skills.

THEMED & EMERGENT CURRICULUM UNITS

Across Primary and Secondary, our staff integrate literacy, numeracy, STEM, arts, and social studies through thematic, cross-curricular projects. These deepen understanding, spark creativity and help students connect learning to real-life contexts—building essential 21st-century skills.

LEARNING EXPEDITIONS & EXCURSIONS

Our Secondary teachers recently participated in professional development around immersive “Learning Expeditions”—interdisciplinary, place-based learning designed to empower students to explore and address real-world challenges.

From camps and industry site visits to museum trips and environmental excursions, students engage with their learning outside the classroom and return with fresh perspectives.



COLLABORATION ACROSS SITES

We unite across campuses and with regional partners. Senior students take part in programs like the Yorke Peninsula Ag Alliance and Certificate II in Electrotechnology, collaborating with neighbouring schools and RTO providers. At Point Pearce, preschoolers regularly join R-2 classes in mixed-age, outdoor play sessions—fostering continuity, strong relationships and a shared learning culture.

Day two involved more learning activities with our Conservation Educator where the children had lots of fun cleaning up after the bisons and matching pictures of animals to their pool!!





Facts about **3-year-old preschool**

Flying Start

for kids

Age-appropriate play-based learning

An extra year of age-appropriate, play-based learning that can boost a child's development in their pivotal years before school.

15 hours* per week
600 hours per year

Up to 15 hours per week available in partnering 3-year-old preschool services from 2026, with all children having access to 15 hours of the universal 3-year-old program by 2032. Fees will be individually set by the service provider.**

With a qualified early childhood teacher

Designed and led by a qualified early childhood teacher, working with early childhood educators, to support children's developmental needs and key learning outcomes.

Rolling out in stages from 2026

Starting from 2026 in long day care services that partner with the government to deliver 3-year-old preschool, as well as government or sessional services in regional or remote areas.

*During the roll-out, services may offer anywhere from 6 to 15 hours a week, depending on capacity and up to 30 hours will be available for children who need it most.
** If you access preschool through a partnering long day care preschool program, you can claim the Commonwealth Childcare Subsidy (CCS). Eligibility for the childcare subsidy is determined by Commonwealth policy.
