

NAIDOC Colouring Competition







Last year, the Ian and Shirley Norman Foundation (ISNF) funded Food Ladder to install a greenhouse at Central Yorke School (CYS) in South Australia. On Wednesday July 12 our CEO, Coralie Nichols, visited our site as part of the NAIDOC Week celebrations and the opening of the greenhouse. Here is what Coralie had to say about her visit.

t was a really joyful day that included CYS's very first smoking ceremony.

The students and the teachers are thrilled with the greenhouse – it is currently fasttracking the vegetable garden growth. They can transfer tomato plants grown from seedlings in a matter of weeks into their vegetable garden from the greenhouse. They are also subsiding their canteen – lettuce on Yorke Peninsula cost \$6 – so they are now growing their own lettuce from seedlings in the greenhouse.

A Year 12 student studying Agriculture (Mitchell) is using the greenhouse for his practical work and is considering a career in hydroponics plants and market gardens.



The school has installed a second-hand commercial kitchen in a demountable next to the greenhouse to operate their home economics classes.

They are so enterprising!

A number of children showed me around the greenhouse, and they are really proud. It was great to hear from the Principal and Deputy Principal about the difference the glasshouse has made to the students at CYS. The students were really happy ISNF visited them and it was great to see how ISNF funding makes a difference on the ground.

We finished up the day with a special R-7 assembly in the PAC with special guests 'The Wiggles' dancing up a storm to the 'Hot Potato'.


Congratulations to Alice, Harry, Isis, Olivia and Tamika who won the best costume prizes.

What is a Lip Dub?

A "lip dub" refers to a specific type of music video that involves:

- **Lip-syncing**: Participants mime the words to a selected song or musical piece.
- **Audio dubbing**: The original audio of the song is overlaid onto the video during post-production, aligning with the participants' lip movements.

SCHOOL LIP DUBS

School lip dubs involve:


- **Participation**: Students, teachers, and other staff are involved, creating a broad snapshot of the school community.
- **One-shot filming**: The entire lip dub is generally filmed in one continuous, unedited shot. This results in a fluid video that moves through various locations within the school such as hallways, classrooms, and outdoor spaces.
- **Choreography**: Because of the one-shot style, precise choreography and coordination are necessary. Participants need to be ready for their part as the camera moves along the predetermined route.
- Promotion: Schools often use these videos as a promotional tool. A wellexecuted lip dub can showcase the creativity, unity and dynamism of the school community, making it attractive to prospective students and parents.
- Learning opportunity: The planning, choreographing and filming of a lip dub provide students with a hands-on experience in project management, teamwork and video production.
















Curriculum and Classroom Strategies Classroom Routines Part 2

Each newsletter we will be highlighting a Berry Street Classroom Strategy This term we are continuing the focus on the importance of classroom routines.

WHY DO ROUTINES SUPPORT EFFECTIVE SCHOOL CULTURE AND INSTRUCTION?

In essence:

- Routines create more time and space for learning
- Routines make learning more efficient.

At CYS we have established routines in place that happen every morning:

- Greeting students at entry.
- Checking in with students and their learning readiness.
- Running a morning circle routine which builds our classroom community, encourages student voice and participation, and enhances the students' readiness to learn.
- Explaining the day's agenda through deliberate steps.

Berry Street encourages teachers to empower students to monitor themselves, communicate and negotiate when they need a short break from learning to renew their



focus. This works when the teacher and student agree on what works well for all involved.

OTHER STRATEGIES

Movement: students need to move their bodies while learning,

Ready to learn plan: giving students clear strategies they can take up when they feel they are losing focus or feeling themselves escalate.

Providing sensory tools: sensory tools or listening stations inside the classroom are there to give students a short break when they need it.
