PHONE POLICY

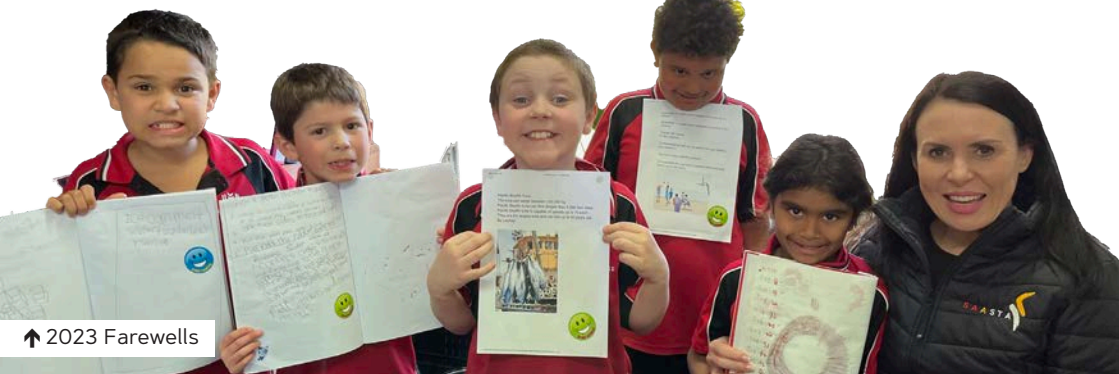

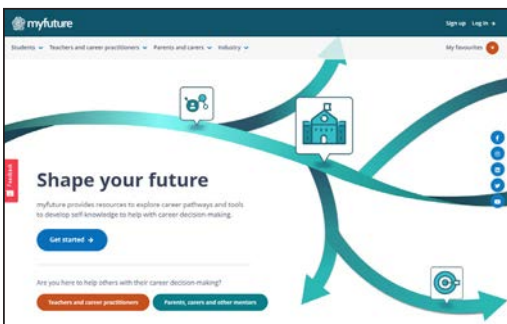

Who is Nick Timmings?



Olympian Nick Timmings was born in 1990 in Perth, Western Australia.

In 2012, at the relatively late age of 20, he made a strong showing in the World Junior **Skeleton** Championships, a winter sliding sport in which an individual athlete rides a small sled, known as a skeleton bobsled (or simply "skeleton"), down a frozen track while lying face down.

He represented Australia at the Beijing 2022 Olympics, setting a Personal Best to finish 25th.

The class joined more than 200 students from the Yorke Peninsula, Eyre Peninsula Mid North, and Adelaide Hills for the education event hosted by the Jamestown Agricultural, Horticultural and Floricultural Society.

The day is particularly important considering the shortage of workers in the rural sector estimated to be around 172,000 in Australia and our students certainly found the day a useful and productive excursion.

CONCERT BAND

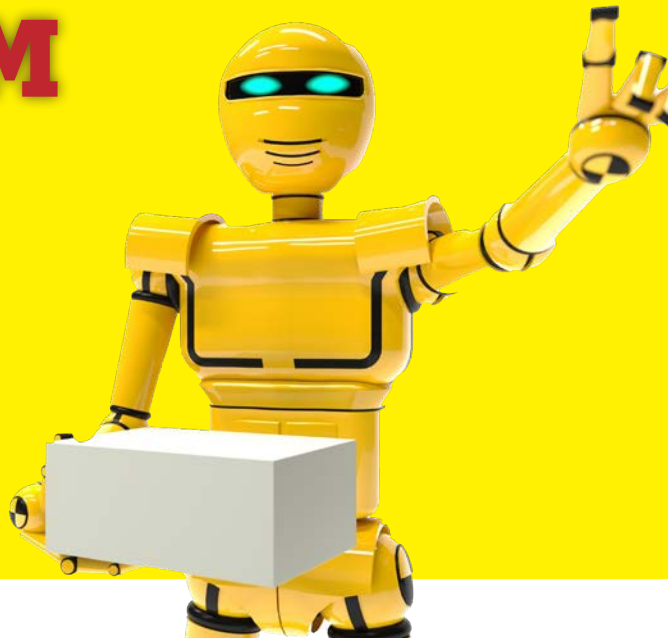

The Reception class made plasticine models of the Billy Goats Gruff to use on the bridges they are constructing. Our design brief was that the goats should be the same

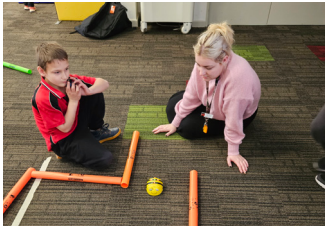
colour but different sizes and that the troll should be a different colour, to make him stand out. Thank you to Mrs Bourne for coming to help us.

4. Competed with other BeeBots to see who could ring a bell first.

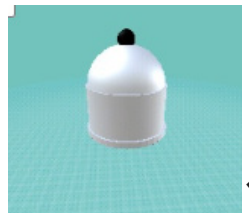
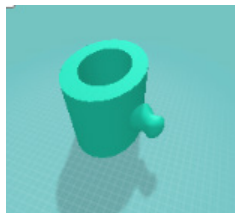
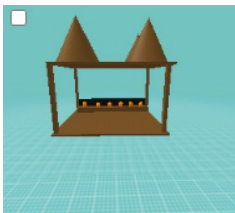
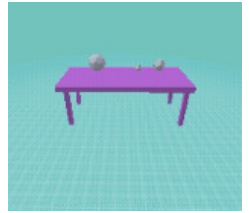
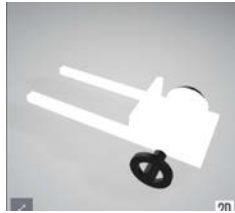


4/5 STEM | Moonta Mines Challenge

The 4/5 classes are working with other schools on the Yorke Peninsula to complete a special project organised by 3D software group 'Maker's Empire', the National Trust and the Moonta Mines Museum. Students have learned to use 3D software, investigated the history of the Moonta Mines and its immigrant settlers, and are

brainstorming and devising items that the early miners would find useful at work, at school or at home.

SIES Community Library Initiative

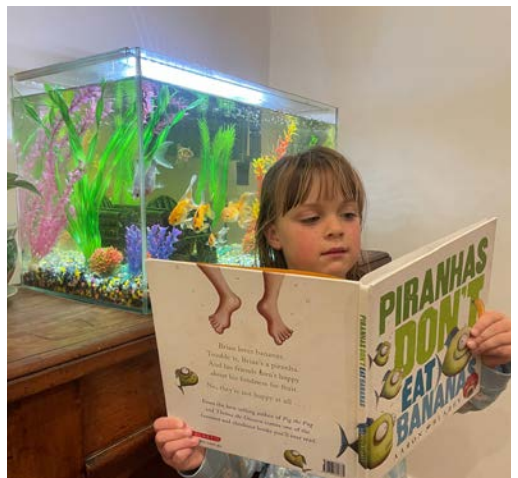


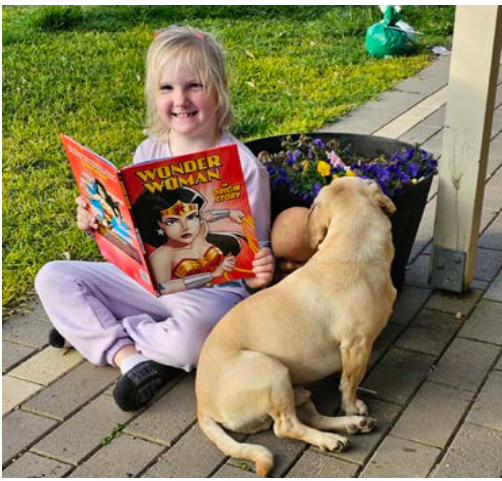

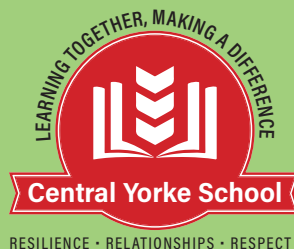
