The Year 12 students will receive their last school report at the end of this term, with their final report coming from the SACE Board once all the exams and final results are calculated.

# **Graduation Dinner**

The Year 12 Graduation Dinner is planned for **Thursday November 17** at the Wallaroo Ale House – more information about Graduation will be sent out as we get closer. Students will not be able to attend the Graduation unless they have signed and returned a 'School Leavers Form' by Friday 29th October. School Leavers Forms will be handed out at the beginning of next term for students to start preparing their departure from school.

# SATAC Application Submission

Another key date that is approaching is the SATAC application submission date of **September 30**, for the \$50 fee – after this date the application fee rises to \$190. As students are aware, Flinders University have announced that they will once again be making offers based on Year 11 results, similar to Adelaide University. # SAASTA Aboriginal Careers Exploration Week

In Week 5 of this term, the Year 10 SAASTA students travelled to Adelaide for the week to involve themselves in the ACE program – Aboriginal Careers Exploration. Prior to this event, the students were required to complete a career choices survey that would identify areas of interest. Following from their responses, they were placed in groups with other students having the same industry interest area. Choices saw our SAASTA students involved in Health Support, Hair and Beauty, Screen/Media/ Gaming/Cyber and Trades.

# LIVING IN ADELAIDE

Students were accommodated at Regency International House, where enjoyable meals were provided as well as single room sleeping arrangements, within apartments of 4 rooms. This allowed our students to socialize with other SAASTA students from across South Australian regional academies.

On arrival in Adelaide on Monday, students ventured to Lights Community and Sports Centre, where they were involved in an Aboriginal Excellence Panel – a group of successful Aboriginal business people spoke to them about their business journey and answered questions previously created by the students. During the day, there were opportunities to undertake basket weaving and modern ceramic art.

# EXPLORING CAREERS

Tuesday to Friday were spent visiting various centres that offered information and training in the student's associated industry area. The Health Support people experienced physiotherapy, midwifery,







First Aid training, nursing, aged care – all a mixture of theory and practical skills. In the hair and beauty group, the students spent time in a salon where they saw hairdressing techniques, beauty treatments and nails, as well as some fashion designing. In Screen/ Media, the students visited the facilities at Flinders University, the Space Discover Centre, learnt about Cyber Security and produced their own mini films. The Trades group had a practical approach to a variety of trades and were given building/ construction challenges in electrical wiring, plumbing, refrigeration, carpentry, plastering, paving and brick work.

# **EVENINGS OFF**

Evenings were a time to relax and the students competed in a game of 10 pin bowling, were challenged in Laser Tag and tested their skills at Mini golf.

### SENIOR ENGLISH EXCURSIONS

# 2022 Aboriginal Learners STEM Congress

On August 18, two of our CYS students travelled to Adelaide for the 2022 Aboriginal Learners STEM Congress at the Adelaide Convention Centre. The congress aims to engage Aboriginal students with science, technology, engineering and math learning and industry experiences to inspire and take on challenging subjects at school.

CYS students gathered amongst 900 students from across the state to listen to nine Indigenous keynote speakers who specialised in STEM fields and had travelled from across Australia to be at the Congress.



We participated in workshops to use traditional materials including thermoplastic resin beaten out from porcupine grass. We toured around UniSA's space centre which simulates the climate conditions of the moon to design and test space rovers.

Our CYS students loved hearing about their Indigenous culture and the role it has played over 60,000 years in the STEM field.

# Food & Hospitality | Masterclass

On Friday August 26 the year 10-12 Food and Hospitality students were treated to a Masterclass with Daniel Newchurch from Newchurch Horticulture. The focus was on native ingredients and the students were very intrigued and excited to try some new foods.

Muffin's made with Nature healss & spices Lenion nyothe watesed mportung





Newchurch Horticulture is a family run farm out of Port Victoria who specialise in growing and selling native foods, in particular herbs and spices. They have also ventured out into some catering jobs at local events. We were impressed to learn that they supply Masterchef and My Kitchen Rules with the native ingredients used on their shows!

Daniel was keen to introduce the students to as many foods as he could in our 2 1/2 hour session. The students helped him to prepare a quandong chutney, it smelt amazing and we couldn't wait to taste it. Next, Daniel introduced us to some native herbs and spices and prepared a flat bread that was flavoured with pepperberry, native



thyme and saltbush. When that was cooked, the aroma in the kitchen was making us all hungry, then came the meat. Daniel marinated some kangaroo in a variety of herbs and spices and cooked it in a very hot pan. We learned that the trick to cooking kangaroo is to cook it hot and fast. When the kangaroo was cooked, he cooked some water buffalo in the same pan. By this time, I think some of us were starting to drool! Finally, Daniel put the masterpiece together, a piece of flatbread, some kangaroo or buffalo, quandong chutney, red onion, native parsley, then topped with another piece of flatbread. He cut it into wedges and we all got to try the kangaroo and buffalo. It was all delicious, but I think I preferred the taste of the

buffalo. We had a bit of time (and thyme) left over so we experimented with some muffins. The lemon myrtle muffins were absolutely delicious as were the savoury muffins that we stuffed with quandong chutney, crispy fried kangaroo and crispy fried saltbush. While we were waiting for the muffins to cook, Daniel made us all a cup of Wattleseed "coffee". It had a slight nutty, chocolate taste and is much better for you than coffee.

The students had a great time learning from Daniel and trying new foods and we were all sad when the time was up.



We are now looking forward to a trip out to Newchurch's farm later in the year, when we will cooking on an open fire.

These programs include, Little Groovers, extended school transition, school students spending time in the ELC for play based learning, teachers and SSO's working across the school and the ELC children accessing the many resources and specialised learning environments at Central Yorke.

# **Shared Reading**

This term, the ELC children during their fortnightly library visits have been engaged in shared reading with the Miss Muir's year 5/6 class. This has been highly successful with many benefits for both groups of children and students. It has also supported our targeted learning outcomes around our PQIP (site improvement) goal of developing children's phonological awareness of initial sounds, syllabification and rhyme to develop children's early reading skills. It is also supporting the 5/6 students who are reluctant to read to pick up a book and read. What better way than sharing a book with a friend! Best of all, there is a buzz of excitement and fun during these sessions.


